









Presidents Report

Welcome to the 2019/20 63rd Annual Report for the Manly Warringah Junior Cricket Association (MWJCA).

The 2019/20 season was one that was cut short by Covid-19, with finals being unable to be played prior to the lockdown. Congratulations to all the winning MWJCA teams and individual award winners. The **Wakehurst Redbacks Cricket Club** won the MWJCA Club Championship, “Peter Tasker Memorial Shield”.

Player numbers were up again this season, with an overall increase of 16% from last season to 219 teams. Girls cricket continues to grow with an increase of 50% from last season, largely due to the great work done by Scott Osborne and Deanne Hutt. We also experienced a significant increase of over 30% in our entry level Master Blast program.

Continued growth in player numbers has put extreme pressure on the facilities used by the MWJCA. This season has seen upgrades to cricket nets at several locations and the new net complex at Nolan’s Reserve is nearing completion. Together with the new amenities building, Nolan’s will become the home of the MWJCA. We will continue to work with the other cricket bodies in the area, Cricket NSW and the Northern Beaches Council to improve all cricket facilities across the area.

I would like to thank all volunteers involved in getting our local boys and girls on the pitch this season. A special thanks to the MWJCA Life Members who continue to support the association (Ross Denny and Tony Pecar), the MWJCA Executive, the MWJCA Committee, the Rep Committee and the Club delegates for all your efforts this season.

The MWJCA Executive Committee was made up of Rachel Chick (Secretary), Toby Horstead (Vice President, Rules), Fiona Brewster (Treasurer) and Scott Osborne who took on the role of Vice President, Girls. Stephen Baldwin continued in the role of Web Administrator, updating our website and Facebook.



A big thank you to Blake Cousemacker, our Rep Committee Chairman, who is standing down this season after several years in the role. Blake has done an excellent job and our representative program has gone from strength to strength under his leadership. Thanks to Matt Meers for assisting as Umpire Coordinator, taking over from the long serving Errol Cranney.

Cricket Australia's Junior Formats continued to be rolled out and next season will see these formats played across all age groups. We trialled white balls in the Under 13 boy's competition and the MWJCA will look to continue to refine our local competition rules and formats to improve Junior cricket.



The 7th season of the Manly Mini Bash T20 tournament was held in February 2020. Long-time organisers, Phill Edwards and Kev Davies, have done a tremendous job again this season. Sadly, it is Phill and Kev's final year running the Mini Bash. You have both made major contributions to the MWJCA over your years and we thank you for your hard work, passion and dedication to junior cricket in the area.

Criteria for Association Awards 2019/20

BOWLING – to qualify for bowling average awards, a bowler must take 15 wickets* and bowl 30 overs during the season

** Where 15 wickets have not been taken by any bowlers in a competition, the bowling average award will be based on bowling 30 overs and the highest number of wickets taken.*

After learning all the basic skills in Junior Blasters, Master Blasters allows kids to experience modified games of cricket using lighter equipment in a format that is fast paced with equal participation. The program was developed to ensure junior cricketers can progress with confidence to Stage 1 of Junior Formats.

Master Blasters

In line with Cricket Australia, Saturday Master Blasters was this year extended to boys and girls **under 9 years** of age with games played at a number of venues across the Northern Beaches within our existing club structure.

The MWJCA had the following Master Blasters centres on Saturday mornings:

- Jackson Road, Warriewood
 - Participating Club was **Peninsula** with **6 Teams**
- Hews Parade/ Wyatt Ave Belrose
 - Participating Clubs were **Forest** and **Wakehurst** with **12 Teams**
- Beacon Hill Oval, Beacon Hill
 - Participating Clubs were **Beacon Hill, Collaroy Plateau** and **Cromer** with **10 Teams**
- Adams St Reserve, Curl Curl
 - Participating Club was **Harbord** with **11 Teams**
- Seaforth Oval, Seaforth
 - Participating Club was **Seaforth** with **16 Teams**

Manly Mini Bash 07 - 2020



In February 2014 MWJCA introduced a T20 competition called “Manly Mini Bash” so that that young players could get an understanding of T20 at a young age to become better, well-rounded players and great T20 players of the future. The tournament was successful and received a lot of very positive feedback from both players and parents. In light of that, the tournament has continued to run and is now in its seventh year.

Some of the driving principles underpinning Manly Mini Bash are that participation comes ahead of winning, and that you play for enjoyment - winning is a bonus. Scores are not entered into MyCricket so players tend to play in a more carefree manner purely for the fun of the game. Bonus points are awarded for achieving certain milestones. These are important factors that make it so enjoyable for both players and parents.

Some minor changes were made to the 2020 Manly Mini Bash 07:

- Registrations were taken online through the use of a Google form to reduce the amount of manual administration required by organisers.
- Team sizes and pitch lengths were adjusted for U13s to be consistent with the rule changes for MWJCA’s weekend comp.
- Fixtures were entered into MyCricket, so that teams could ensure their players were listed for each match for insurance purposes. Scores were not entered into MyCricket consistent with Manly Mini Bash principles.

Once again it was run as a separate tournament and scores and results were not entered into MyCricket. As it was wholly standalone from the Saturday morning competition:

- Match results had no impact on the Saturday morning league tables.
- Player scores had no impact on individual player awards at the end of the season.
- Match results and scores had no bearing on club championship points.


Consideration was again given to a girl’s Manly Mini Bash tournament, but was decided against this as girls already play T20 in the MWJCA weekend comp. However, this year boy’s teams were strongly encouraged to invite girls to play in their team with girls allowed to play up to 2 years below their age group. Unfortunately, there was little evidence of this being implemented by teams.

Structure

As usual, boy's teams from U11 Division 1 and above were invited to participate. Simon Martin from Harbord Devils Cricket Club managed the recruitment campaign this year for the first time and his assistance was greatly appreciated. MMB 07 was comprised of 7 leagues and because of the numbers of teams and the reduced ability to mix age groups (due to pitch lengths varying by age) we had to compromise on team numbers per league. The ideal number is 4 but we had the following:

Under 11 / A (4 teams)	Under 11/B (6 teams)
Under 12 / A (4 teams)	Under 12/B (3 teams + a bye)
Under 13 / A (6 teams)	
Under 14 / A (6 teams)	
Under 15-18A / A (4 teams)	

Out of this season's 109 eligible teams 33 played MMB – a participation rate of only 30%. All teams that wanted to play were accommodated except for one. It's clear that that MMB participation rate continues to trend downwards:



Once again, MWJCA provided bright orange balls which not only help to differentiate from other cricket, but also have a very practical impact on visibility which is an important safety consideration with matches completing at 7:15pm. Orange balls are unavailable in the smaller size so pink balls were used for U11s and U12s.

Leagues with four teams were scheduled to play each other once in pool rounds. Knockout semi-finals are then played (1 vs 4 and 2 vs 3) for places in the finals. The bonus system of points for certain playing milestones continued from previous years.

Leagues with six teams should play four pool rounds with no semi-finals – after four rounds the top two teams play the final.

The league with only 3 teams unfortunately had byes. After 3 rounds the top placed team had a bye and played the round 4 winner of the other 2 teams in the final.

This year the tournament was unfortunately badly affected by rain with most of the round 2 matches and many of the finals rained off. Only 3 out of the 7 finals could be played.

Finals

Semi-finals and finals are decided purely on runs scored with bonus points playing no part. With the kind cooperation of the Manly Touch Football Association we were able to play some finals at Nolans Reserve again this year. This is something we hope to do every year in order to create a carnival atmosphere. Only one night of finals could be played due to rain and there was no BBQ which meant there was no fund-raising for next year.

The support of independent umpires for the finals was very much appreciated.

Thanks go to Mike Pawley Sports for yet again providing generous prizes for finals including cricket bats.

Most Valuable Player (MVP) awards

The MVP award is given to the player who earns the most bonus points for his team. Sydney Sixers once again generously donated a signed bat as a prize. And this year we also had a signed bat kindly donated by Cricket NSW.

This year's MVP award went to **Seth Thompson** (U14 Beacon Hill Bombers).

The runner-up MVP award went to **Ethan Buchanan** (U14 St Augustines White).

We thank everyone for their support and participation over the last 7 years and hope that the new organisers can take MMB to bigger and better things. One major concern is dwindling participation. We have also seen a worrying increase in teams pulling out at the last minute which creates very big problems for organisers. These will need to be addressed if the tournament is to remain viable.

We would also like to see boys' teams inviting more girls to join their teams for MMB.

2019/20 Manly-Warringah Female Cricket



Summary

Girls cricket continues its terrific growth on the Northern Beaches, thanks to everyone involved for another fantastic season. We once again welcomed new players and teams into our competitions across the U11, U13 and U15 age groups. This was MWJCA's 4th season of offering all girls cricket since launching in 2016/17 and we have seen our numbers grow from 20 to now **220 playing in 24 teams**. There is also strong participation from girls in the Master Blaster programs, which will lead to continued growth in the girl's competitions. The association would like to thank all the Clubs girl's coordinators for their efforts this season along with the coaches and managers.

The MWJCA female cricket pathway is in place from entry level Junior and Master Blaster to club competitions (U11, U13 and U15) to representative teams in the U13 and U15 age groups and then to the NSW Premier Cricket as part of the Manly club's (MWDCC) female teams. MWDCC this season entered 4 teams into women's competitions – 2nd grade, 3rd grade, U18 Brewer Shield (similar in standing to the boys Green Shield) and an U15 development competition.

We continued to use the popular "girl's hub" grounds at David Thomas and Millers for the U11 and U13 girls and added Passmore for the U15 girls. The collection of Magenta shade tents was increased which provided a great look and feel, not mention much needed shade along with scorer's tables and gear. The Hub has allowed the girls and their families to feel part of the cricket community and enabled the girls to get to know other girls more easily and see friends in other teams more often. **The Hub concept was the runner up in the national Cricket Australia A Sport For All Awards in the Innovation Category, which was very exciting.**



Well done to Sam Croll, Ashley Jones and Darren Kilkeary who once again drove fundraising for the McGrath Foundations **Pink Stumps Day at our girl's hub, raising over \$2100** after a number of attempts due to the wet weather after the Christmas break - a terrific outcome. Thanks to all who contributed to a great cause.

Another sign of the growth and interest in girls' cricket was the number of girls who have registered (62) to trial for our rep squads with registrations up strongly again on the previous season. Unfortunately, the trials have had to be delayed due to COVID-19, however we look forward holding them when safe to do so.

MWJCA had a record number of girls selected into the Cricket NSW Academy squads (12, which included 8 in our U15 Rep team and 4 from the U13 Rep team). Manly girls also represented at NSW State Challenge matches, NSW U16 All Schools team, NSW 12 and under School team, NSW PSSA cricket state championships and school teams covering Sydney North, Polding and CIS and Catholic colleges. Congratulations to all who were successful.



Manly-Warringah Under 11 Sixers Girls Cricket Competition

The Manly Under 11 all girl's competition entered its second season and it proved to be a very successful one with girls having a great time and developing their cricket skills. The U11 Sixers Girls Cricket League is designed to keep girls in the game after they graduate from the junior and master blaster programs. Nine teams entered the competition (up from 5 the previous season) from Collaroy, Peninsula, Seaforth, Forest, Wakehurst and Beacon Hill clubs.



The competition is a 7-a-side T20 format (stage 1) played with a modified ball. The batters bat for their allotted 17 balls (no actual outs for this age group). The games were played on a Saturday afternoon at the 'hub' and completed in 2 hours.

Congratulation to **Wakehurst Red** who ended the season on top of the table.



Manly-Warringah Under 13 Sixers Girls Cricket Competition

The Under 13 girl's competition is part of the Sixers Girls Cricket League and continues to be a huge success. Eleven teams entered the competition (7 last season) from seven clubs – Beacon Hill, Forest, Peninsula, Wakehurst, Harbord, Collaroy and Seaforth.

The competition is a 9-a-side T20 format played with a hard ball (when you're out, you're out), with retirement after 18 balls. The games were played on a Saturday afternoon at the 'hub' taking 2.5 hours to complete.

This year we had our first tied match and some competitive matches into the Christmas break. Unfortunately, the second part of the season was heavily disrupted by heat, rain and finally the coronavirus

Many congratulations to the **Collaroy Plateau Cyclones** who finished top of the table and won the competition.

Manly-Warringah Under 15 Sixers Girls Cricket Competition

The Under 15 girl's competition had four teams enter the competition - Forest, Peninsula, Wakehurst and Harbord. As with the Under 13's this competition is part of the Sixers Girls Cricket League, is a 9-a-side T20 format played with a leather cricket ball with retirement after 30 balls faced. Games were played on Saturday afternoon at the 'hub'.

Congratulations to the **Forest District Cricket Club** for winning their second U15 competition against Wakehurst in a very close and exciting game. With many of the Forest team now having played 4 or 5 seasons of all girls cricket they will be looking to move into Manly's women premier cricket teams, we wish them all the best and thank them for being some of the pioneers of all girl's cricket. This Finals match ended up being the only final played in this seasons MWJCA competitions, so it was great to get one final played.



MWJCA Representative Competitions

For the fourth year running we entered a representative team into both the Under 13 Mollie Dive and the Under 15 Margaret Peden NSW Youth Championship competitions (formerly the DCA).

We are very pleased to report that both teams performed very well with the U13 Mollie Dive team making it all the way to the Grand Final with some very strong performances but unfortunately went down in a tight battle against North



Shore in the final. The U15 Margaret Peden team played great cricket losing only one game but unfortunately missed the finals. However, they can take some heart from beating both the Grand Final teams during the competition rounds.

The U15 girl's rep team also entered the Under 15 Girls Western NSW carnival held in Orange in January playing teams from Western NSW, Gordon, Penrith and Parramatta. They had a fantastic time away 'on tour' and finished up winning the carnival in a powerful display against Parramatta.

Girls predominately from our U13 rep squad entered two teams into the

Kookaburra Cup Carnival in Canberra in October where they also played some great cricket and had a fantastic time away together on tour. The Manly Dolphins team ended up runner up but more importantly the girls thoroughly enjoyed the tour and their season of rep cricket.

Finally, a massive **thank you to Deanne Hutt** who has decided to step back from administering MWJCA girls cricket after six years at the helm. Under 10 and 11 Cricket - Junior Format Stage 1

The Australian Cricket Junior Formats have delivered outstanding results and have proven to provide a far better playing and learning experience for boys and girls early in their cricket journey.

The evidence confirms the players face more balls, can play more shots in more areas, take more wickets and field far more than a traditional 11 a side, full-length pitch formats.

From 2017/18 the MWJCA adopted the Cricket Australia Club Stage 1 Junior Formats for Under 9 and Under 10 cricket. For the 2018/19 season MWJCA moved with the roll out desired by Cricket Australia and moved Stage 1 Format cricket to U10 and U11. Both age groups used the Kookaburra Rookie plastic/rubber cricket ball and played on 16m pitches.

The MWJCA's aim of Club Stage 1 cricket is to enable EVERY player to participate in an enjoyable game. This is no longer an average cricket format of batting in pairs and bowling on rotation. Instead with 7 a side batsman face 17 balls each and everyone gets to bowl. Wickets result in an addition of 4 runs to the bowling team. Player roles are rotated fairly and equally throughout the team to enable them to develop as cricketers and reach their full potential later in their playing life.

There were 64 teams across the Stage 1 boy's competition and 9 girl's teams in 2019/20.

Under 12 and 13 Cricket - Junior Format Stage 2

From 2018/19 the MWJCA moved with Cricket Australia and adopted Stage 2 Junior Format for Under 12 Boys cricket. For the 2019/20 Season Stage 2 Junior Format was also adopted for Under 13 Boys Cricket. For Under 13 Boys this is a move away from the more traditional forms of cricket, and also signaled an end to two-day Under 13 cricket. The Junior Format Stage 2 was also continued for Under 13 Girls Cricket.

From the 2020/21 season, Under 12 and Under 13 Boys cricket is only one-day matches of 30 overs per side played on an 18m pitch. Teams are 9 a side with batsmen retiring after 35 deliveries. Bowling is shared around. Additionally, MWJCA

continued our participation rules for this age group to ensure that as many cricketers get a go as possible.

In a further innovation, the use of a white 142gm leather ball was trialed for the moving Under 13 Boys competition. The intent of the trial was to test the performance in the dew of the morning of a ball other than the traditional red. With all formats moving to one-day cricket or shorter, and Youth Championship moving to coloured clothing, it is anticipated that MWJCA will also move to coloured clothing and coloured balls in the coming seasons.

Representative Chairman's Report 2019/20



The 2019/20 season was the dawn of a new era for junior representative cricket. Cricket New South Wales restructured what was previously called the "District Cricket Association" competitions. The new competitions were called "Cricket N.S.W. Youth Championships", and involved a longer competition, with no under 11 competition and including a division 2 competition for both under 12 and 13 boys.

Final teams were selected, and Manly Warringah entered teams in all seven boys and two girls CNSW Youth Championships competitions and five Presidents Cup competitions.

The season started well, with Joel Davies selected in the under 16 Australian team - a thoroughly deserved selection.

The Youth Championships campaign was successful. Congratulations to the Under 12 division 2 and Under 13 division 2 on taking out the titles. Both teams won back to back premierships and created history by winning their respective competitions in the maiden year for those competitions.

The Under 13 Mollie Dive girls had a great season making the grand final and just falling short to finish second. The Under 13 boys made the semi-final as did the Under 16 team. The Under 16 team went through the competition stage undefeated to only lose one game, the semi-final.

There were some outstanding individual performances during the Youth Championship season. For batting, Joel Davies topped the Under 16 aggregate and average, while Tyrone Fender, Rohan Chang and Will Toohey all finished 2nd, 3rd and 5th in the Under 12 division 2 aggregates, Jack Toohey 4th in Under 13 Division 2, and Jessica Mulcahy 4th in Under 15 girls.

In the bowling aggregates, Harry McCracken topped Under 12 division 2 wickets, Lewis Whiley 2nd in Under 13 division 1, Archie Rochford 2nd in Under 13 division 2, Tom Wood 2nd in Under 16.



Another change for the Youth Championships competitions was the umpire's awarding 3-2-1 points on player performances for each match, which determines the player of the year. Congratulations to Joel Davies on being named the Under 16 Watson Shield player of the year.

After a successful Youth Championships campaign the IDCA Presidents Cup competitions started well for all teams prior to the Christmas break.

Over the Christmas break, a number of our teams participated in regional carnivals where Manly had a lot of success. Firstly, the Under 11 Division 1 team won the Under 11 Newcastle Carnival undefeated. In their first season of junior rep cricket the boys played the final on turf at Newcastle No. 1 Sports Ground and brought home the trophy. The Under 15 Margaret Peden girls travelled to Orange for the first time and on the Western NSW Girls Carnival, also as undefeated champions. The Under 12 division 1 team made the grand final of the Lismore Carnival. The Under 13 division 1 boys won the Ballina Carnival undefeated, making it three years in a row that Manly Warringah has won the Ballina carnival - truly a great achievement for Manly Warringah.

During the regional carnivals, we had a number of players who received individual accolades. Billy Kwan was named player of the Newcastle under 14 carnival as picked by the umpires. An outstanding achievement considering Billy is a wicket keeper/batsman. Ethan Buchanan won the batting award at the Ballina carnival, Jack Slater took a hat trick at the Under 14 Newcastle carnival and Ellie James took a hat trick at the Under 15 girls Western NSW Girls Carnival.



Also during the Christmas break, we had 11 players selected by Cricket NSW for the State Challenge. Eliza Henry and Emily Horstead - U13 girls, Will Brewster, Ethan Buchanan, Tom Molloy and Lewis Whiley - U13 boys, Andrew Boulton, Roop Dhillon, Bailey Foster, Toby Laughton and Josh Lawson – U14 boys.

The Christmas break over, the Presidents Cup competition resumed and more success for Manly Warringah. The mighty Under 11 division 2 team took out the title undefeated, while the Under 16 team won the final to bring home the silverware for the U16 Presidents Cup for Manly two years in a row.

Also, congratulations to Mitchell Gilligan who took out the overall Under 15 IDCA Cup bowling award – 18wickets @ 9.17. A fantastic achievement!

After all rep competitions are done, Manly Warringah finished with seven titles!

To the girls from the Under 15's who have completed their junior rep careers, you have played a huge part in getting girls cricket to where it is. Well done and I wish you all the very best.

For the boys in the Under 16's it is their final season of junior rep cricket. Six years ago, the then head coach Ross Denny oversaw the selection of 24 boys for the D.C.A and Presidents Cup teams. That season the D.C.A. team only lost one game - the grand final, and the Presidents Cup team lost one game during the competition stage and then went on to win the final. Eliza had a season to remember, as she led from the front in all areas of the game, amassing 277 runs @ 46.17 with three half centuries across the season. The aggregate of 277 runs was the highest individual season run tally in Manly’s Mollie Dive history. 2020 Lismore Under 12 Carnival Grand Finalists

After an unbelievable season last year, we knew it was going to be tough to go back to back. We didn't achieve this, but the coaching staff could not have been prouder of the boys and it was a privilege to coach them again.

Although we didn't win the main title of the Cawsey Shield, just missing out on the semis by 3 points, we did win the Kookaburra Cup in Canberra and made the final of the Lismore tournament, where we went down to Parramatta. I can safely say it was another successful season, where we saw the boys grow not only as cricketers but as young men.

The season started off with two 20/20 matches which we won very comfortably. They were two very strong bowling matches where we rolled the opposition very cheaply in both games and passed their totals one and two down respectively. Highlights of the games were the strong bowling performances of our strike bowlers Harley Cruikshank and Julian Osbourne with Billy Martin dominating our second with a hat-trick – an amazing bowling effort.

After these games, we had a two-week break where we headed down to Canberra to contest the Kookaburra Cup. It was a great week of fun where it was very evident that the boys are great mates and enjoy each other's company. As always, the parents had just as much fun.

The week started horribly with two losses and we thought our chance of making the final was over, but we finally clicked, results started going our way, and somehow we were playing the final. The final was a great game of fight by the boys and it showed the boys' resilience. We got only 77 off our 20 overs but the boys fielded and bowled unbelievably to keep Parramatta to 55 – an amazing win and tournament.



Some highlights of the week were: Flynn Pavely's 3 wickets against Hawkesbury; Gus Greenland and Scott Tipton's opening partnership and Billy's 3-11 against St George; Jules' 57 off 30 balls, Gus' 1 wicket and Luke MacFarlane's 20 against Hornsby (great to see in his first rep tournament); Neo Pressley's crucial runs along with Matthew Melville and Gus in the final gave us a score to defend. Then Matthew's spell of 4-8 helped us get over the line. All of this was again led very well by Captain, Caleb Conners. His leadership was demonstrated by sitting out in the final while being there to support the boys all the way. It was a great win and a lot of fun was had by all.

Two days later we were back playing in the main comp. We were sluggish and not quite on song and it showed in the result as we were beaten convincingly by a very good North Shore side. All aspects of our game were down, especially our batting, and the question was, could we turn it around for our next game. The highlight of the game was Julian's 4 wickets.



Our next game against Hornsby was a win but we still struggled with our batting. Some great bowling saw us restrict Hornsby for 78 but again our top order struggled to be 5-20 before a great partnership between Lukas Overhoff and Billy got us over the line. It was a win but not a convincing one.

We saw our next game as a must win against South East Sydney. Unfortunately, again our batting wasn't up to the task and we could only manage 122, with Caleb's 32 being



the highlight. South East Sydney's batting was very good and they passed us 3 down. We were then relying on other results to make the final.

Round 6 saw us against Northern Districts. We wanted a strong result and we got it. Some very good bowling from all our bowlers, highlighted by Arlo Thompson's 3 wickets and Caleb's 3-0 saw us roll ND's for 55. With some positive batting from Billy and Luke we passed the score very quickly. We were still in the comp and the boys starting to gain momentum.

In Round 7 we defeated Inner West Harbour by 60 runs. Scott led the way with 42, while Harley's 4 wickets and Arlo's 2 for 10 off 8 led the way with the bowling. We were still not perfect with the bat but our bowling was outstanding.

Round 8: D-Day. We needed to beat St George and needed South Eastern to beat North Shore for us to move into 2nd. We played really well, it was our best game of the year and we defeated St George comfortably but unfortunately North Shore defeated South Eastern, their first loss. The highlight of our St George game was our overall performance, a complete batting and bowling performance. Our bowling was led by Billy and Jules with 2 wickets and Mr. Economical, the Sheik of Tweak, Arlo 0-11 off 8 gave us the start we needed. We displayed our best batting performance of the whole tournament. Scott and Caleb's partnership was one of great maturity and led us to victory – a great win.

We wanted to win our last game to finish off the season on a good note and that we did. We scored an amazing 5-261 off our 40 overs. Scott and Gus got us off to a great start with a 100-run opening stand. Gus got out for 49. Then it was the Scott and Billy show with Billy scoring 88 of 67 balls and Scott, our first centurion, scoring 101 off 110. It was a great moment to see Scott score his century and with Simon not there, there were plenty who ensured we captured the moment for him. Flynn's 3 wickets with Arlo's and Harley's two ensured we won the game.

The end of our Cawsey Shield season saw us just missing out on the semis. We didn't click early enough to make the finals but it was great fun and I was proud of the way the boys gelled as a team and as mates.

We finished our season off with a trip to Lismore. To sum up Lismore, it was hot, hot, hot but so much fun. A tournament on turf was something the boys were looking forward to.

To say Day 1 was hot, was an understatement. The boys did well just to survive the two games and I have no doubts that the swim at home was the highlight. We won both games quite comfortably. Our batting highlights for Day 1 were Scott, Harley and Flynn's 30's in Game 1 and Julian's 26 in Game 2. The bowling highlights were Harley's



3 wickets with Matthew's 2-0 and Lukas' 2-7 while in Game 2, the highlights were Caleb's 3 wickets with Matthew's 2-0 and Scott's 2-5.

Day 2 saw another hot day and the only game on synthetic and it was a rip snorter. Such a good, tense game to watch. Off our 25 overs we got 198 with Scott, Matthew and Harley all getting 30. It was a very good run chase by Illawarra who fell 8 runs short. Our bowling was led by Jules and Aidan Boulton with 2 wickets each.

Our next game was won comfortably after a shaky start. Our two big boppers of Jules and Flynn led the way with the bat, while Jules and Scott lead the way with the ball.

We headed into the semi against North Shore undefeated. It was a great game, with us winning by two wickets. I think this game will be remembered more as Parking Gate, especially by Simon Martin. We bowled first and got a wicket with the first ball and we continued strongly from there, rolling North Shore for 116. Arlo and Harley led the way with 3 wickets but it was Aidan who bowled unbelievably well to get 2 wickets. Harry McCracken also kept the screws on, with some very tight bowling.

Chasing 116 on a wicket that was getting hard to bat on, I still liked our chances. It was a chase that we never looked comfortable with, everyone getting a start without consolidating their innings. Gus was our rock up front to hold the innings together but it was left to two of our bowlers Hazza and Zane Cassie to bring us home. It was a very good win against a very good team.

The final was a game that could have gone either way. We started really well with the ball, having Parramatta 5-48, but lost our way before getting back on track to keep Parramatta to 160 off 45 overs. We were quietly confident.

Unfortunately, the run chase got off to a bad start with a run out. We then consolidated and looked likely victors, however lost wickets at regular intervals, collapsing to be all out for 123. Our captain led from the front with 34 and looked very much in control before being caught very well. It was a great tournament, one the boys should all be proud of.

Lismore summed up this group of boys and parents. It was such a fun week with everyone enjoying each other's company, both on and off the field. Lismore was also a sad time for us as we lost two of our younger but highly valued players. Arlo "Sheik of Tweak" Thompson and Aidan "The Smiling Assassin" Boulton and families will be greatly missed. These two boys are amazingly talented cricketers and have been an important part of our team and its' success and their families contributed to the spirit of the team.

Captain, Caleb Conners, had another year of growth as a leader, learning to deal with the many difficulties of captaining. He should be very proud of the way he led the team again.

I would like to congratulate Arlo Thompson on being player of the year. Over the two seasons he has been an amazing bowler. For a young leggie, he has great control and a wrong un that boys struggle to pick. He will be sorely missed and we wish him all the best next year in the U12's.

Finally, the parents' support and willingness to make the coach's job easier was truly appreciated and contributed to a fun and enjoyable season. This included significant contributions by scorers Lou Macfarlane and Maggie Tipton, Manager Nathan Cassie (and wife Kerry) and Assistant Coach, Steve Conners.

2019/20 NSW Youth Championships Under 12 Division 2 Champions

Back to Back Champions!!

What an achievement by this fantastic bunch of young Manly players to win the NSW Youth Championships Under 12 division 2 competition. After winning the Under 11 Presidents Cup competition undefeated last season we all knew that whomever we played this year would lift against us and try and knock us over.

Whilst there were some incredible individual performances on the field, it was the team first attitude by every single one of the players which was the most pleasing thing to see. The boys really enjoyed their cricket and from a coach's perspective it was great to witness them grow as cricketers and develop their game.

At one point this team had won 15 consecutive games (including last season) before falling just short of a run chase in the last round of the regular season vs Parramatta. However, this loss shook the boys up a bit and the very next week in the semi-final the boys won convincingly against Parramatta to book a spot in the Grand Final.

A healthy rivalry was brewing over the course of the season with North Shore and we knew we would have to be at our absolute best to take home the silverware against a high quality opposition. After some tense moments, the winning runs were hit, and the boys had achieved the honour of winning the inaugural NSW Youth Championships competition.

A feature of this team was how much they each enjoyed their team mate's successes. It's all about the team and although we consistently maintained a culture of not focusing too much on individual statistics it is important at the end of a season to



acknowledge a few noteworthy individual performances.

A few highlights were:

Tyrone Fender - maiden century (107*) in any form of cricket on top of two other half centuries (75, 63)

Harry McCracken - leading wicket taker (24 wickets) in the whole NSWYC competition with his leggies

Rohan Chang - 3 half centuries (77*, 76, 50)

Will Toohey - 2 half centuries (55, 51*)

Robbie Graham-McDowell – first rep half century (66) plus Player of the Grand Final award

Keegan Webb – most dismissals by a wicketkeeper (11, including 7 stumpings)



Although these are the main highlights, every player contributed to our victories with bat, ball or in the field in some way over the course of the season. All players can claim to be better cricketers at the end of the season than they were at the start, with a wealth of new experiences under pressure to draw upon in future years. That is all you can ask for as a coach.

Two players (**Vyv Bhargava** and **Claude Remond**) donned the baggy blue for the first time and enjoyed their first experience of being full-time rep squad members. **Sam Roche** was initially selected in our development squad but ended up playing multiple games throughout the season, often called up at very late notice, and was a great asset to the squad.



This team had the luxury of an absolutely amazing group of parents who I have to thank so much for making everything run so smoothly on match day. To know that all the catering was under control, scorers were ready, the ground was being setup, gazebos were in place and most importantly the coffee run was underway, really allowed me to focus on coaching the boys.

A HUGE thanks to our team manager **Shane Fender** for doing the hardest job of all getting us organized each week, umpires, catering roster, balls, scores entry, assistance at training just to name a few. It's been a great ride the last two years and we couldn't have done it without you.

At the end of the day, the boys played some VERY good cricket...which is all we can ask. If you do that the results will look after themselves.

It's an absolute privilege to be entrusted as Coach of this talented Manly rep side and I am looking forward to witnessing the boys further developing their cricket and representing Manly with pride over the next few years.

Tyrone Fender (captain)

Tyrone was once again entrusted with the captaincy role this season and should be very proud of leading this team to back to back championship titles, a very rare feat. Tyrone's individual contributions played a significant role in the team's overall success, particularly his batting where he clubbed 380 runs at an average of 42.22 including his first break through century (107*) and two half-centuries (75 and 63). Tyrone's runs aggregate was 2nd in the entire Under 12 NSWYC competition. Ty also contributed with some key wickets which in addition to his runs, resulted in him recording the highest MyCricket Champion Player score in the competition. Tyrone's captaincy also continued to develop this season, particularly given the many new fielding restriction rules he had to deal with. Great season!

Harry McCracken (vice-captain)

Harry achieved an outstanding haul of 24 wickets with his leggies at an average of 10.54, including five separate innings taking either 3 or 4 wickets. Harry should be extremely proud of being the leading wicket taker in the entire NSWYC U12 competition, 7 wickets clear of 2nd place. A particularly noticeable development improvement for Harry was his consistency, flight and thinking more about his field placements. As the team's strike spin bowler, his workload was immense but Harry always responded by consistently taking key wickets, particularly in big games against the likes of North Shore and Parramatta. Harry's batting also improved this year when given the opportunity, particularly his front foot play which opened up many more scoring zones for him. Harry always put in a solid performance in the field including 3 catches in the Grand Final.

Rohan Chang

Rohan really built on the momentum from last year and delivered multiple match winning performances as one half of our very successful opening batting partnership. His tally of 338 runs placed him 3rd in the overall NSWYC aggregates and his average of 42.25 was the best amongst his Manly team. Rohan's consistency was a feature of his season with three half centuries (77*, 76 and 50) as well as another score of 47. It was great to see Rohan focus a lot more on converting those starts into bigger scores this season and he definitely has the ability to achieve triple figures if he maintains his



concentration levels and resets after reaching fifty. Whether we were chasing a total or setting one ourselves, Rohan's naturally aggressive style more often than not set us up with a solid foundation towards victory. Rohan worked extremely hard on his fielding this season and was one of the biggest improvers amongst the squad in the field.

Will Toohey

Will played a key role at number 3 this season scoring 295 runs at an average of 32.8 including 2 half centuries (55, 51*) and a solid 46. Will is one of the team's youngsters but took on the responsibility of the number 3 role with great maturity. Will developed a strong understanding with the openers which meant he was comfortable joining them in the 1st or the 30th over and settling into the mode of the game pretty quickly. A few areas we worked on with Will were shot selection, timing and getting good balls away and it was clear that more scoring zones were opened up for Will as the season progressed. Occasionally, the opposition would still put one in his sweet spot which would more often be deposited well over the square leg boundary for six, particularly one at Lake Park which we think went 60 metres. With continued application and concentration Will definitely has the ability to play longer innings and convert those 40s and 50s into higher scores. Will's fielding improved considerably this season, particularly a couple of sharp catches he took in the gully.

Robbie Graham-McDowell

Robbie had limited opportunities with the bat this season due to the consistent performances of the top order but when he did get out into the middle he showed us all what a talent he is. In his 5 innings, he still managed to rack up 165 runs at an average of 33, striking at just under 100. Robbie exploded twice against the quality North Shore attack with two match winning innings of 66 in the regular rounds and 49 in the Grand Final, an innings which earned him the Player of the Grand Final accolade. Whilst a naturally aggressive player, there were times when Robbie really knew his role and had to dig in and that Grand Final innings was a perfect demonstration of that when a few wickets were falling around him. Robbie was also one of our best fielders with a very safe pair of hands, taking some great catches throughout the season. A great team man who always kept a positive frame of mind even in the few games that he didn't bat or bowl.

Neo Pressley

Neo proved to be a real asset to our team this year, delivering some key contributions when given the opportunity. His best performance of the season was in the semi-final when he was called up to open the innings at the very last minute. He played a very mature knock of 41 and then followed up with a sensational bowling display (3/14) in what proved to be a match winning performance. Neo is an elegant batsman with a rock solid defence and if he keeps developing the ability to turn over the strike and get



the good balls away he will no doubt convert into the bigger scores he is capable of. There were times when Neo came into bat with only a couple of overs to go but he always had a team first attitude to close out the innings without worrying about his personal statistics. Neo also had an excellent season in the field, leading the way in catches taken.

Luke Kennedy

Luke is a great team man who always seems to keep a cool head no matter what the situation. His unbeaten innings of 31 under extreme pressure in the Grand Final was a great example of a player patiently waiting for his opportunity and then grabbing it with both hands. Luke and his team mates will always remember him hitting the winning runs in the Grand Final with a beautiful shot through mid-wicket which seemed to take an eternity to cross the boundary! Even better considering it was his Dad's birthday that day! Luke's bowling improved this season with the highlight being a sensational 3 for 3 performance against Northern Districts and he has potential to keep developing into a solid first change bowler and allrounder in future seasons. Luke always threw himself around in the field, showing us that he is one of the best fielders in the squad.

Keegan Webb

Keegan was the standout wicketkeeper in the whole NSWYC Under12/2 competition this year. His development since last season and even as this season progressed was impressive to watch. Statistically, he led the way with 11 dismissals, including 7 stumpings but we challenged Keegan to also lead the way by being the heartbeat of the team, not only with his standard of wicketkeeping but also his energy levels and talk. Keegan developed an excellent understanding with our strike bowlers, particularly the spinners. Having a sharp wicketkeeper contributed greatly to piling scoreboard pressure upon our opposition which ultimately resulted in wickets.

Keegan didn't get too much time at the crease and had to play for the team in the final overs most of the time but it is clear that he values his wicket as he was not dismissed once. One of the hardest trainers in the squad.

Vyv Bhargava

This was Vyv's first selection in a Manly-Warringah representative team and it was definitely a proud moment for him to receive his baggy blue cap. Vyv had limited opportunities with the bat this season but always managed to keep up a very positive, team first attitude even in the few games when he did not get a chance to bat or bowl. Vyv actually saved his best performance for the Grand Final, showing us what he is capable of by really digging in when we needed a bit of stability. Hopefully, this experience under pressure and Vyv's dedication at training translates into more on field success in the future. I'm sure Vyv will always fondly remember winning a championship in his first rep season.

Lachlan Coy

It was a priceless asset having an extremely accurate left arm quickie of Lachlan's quality in our lineup, particularly rare at such a young age. Lachie snared 14 wickets for the season at an average of 12 with a best haul of 4/8. As a reflection of his excellent performances, effort and general attitude Lachie was promoted to the Manly Division 1 side when called up due to injury, performing very well in that game. Although enjoying a good haul of wickets, the number of 'play and misses' to Lachie's bowling was astounding, particularly outside off stump to right handed batsmen. This pressure that Lachie applied resulted in the development of good bowling partnerships with the other quicks and the spinners which would often lead to a wicket for the team at the other end. Lachlan is such a 'coachable' kid and a very good listener to any advice coming his way. Lachie is an outstanding fielder with a great arm and he would always enthusiastically take on the deeper fielding positions around the boundary.

Luke Peters

Luke is a great team man, regularly displaying a positive team first attitude throughout the season despite many games where he didn't get the opportunity to bat or bowl himself. On his day, he is capable of anything and he proved that he is a game changer when he clubbed a quick fire 21 in the semi-final vs Parramatta to steer us to an ultimately match winning team total. Luke is always very sharp in the field, whether it be roaming the boundary or in the infield and he was never too far from the action chiming in with some key catches and run outs. Some key wickets also came Luke's way and if he keeps working on his consistency and control he has the potential to develop into a very damaging all-rounder.

Claude Remond

Claude must be an intimidating prospect for a young under 12 opposition opening batsman when he marks out that long run and comes steaming in with the new ball, follows through and gets right up close (without saying a word). Having got a taste of reps last season in one game, Claude was very proud to be a full-time member of the squad this season. His aggression with the ball was always good to see and he was rewarded with 9 wickets at an average of 18.9 over the season, a great effort. His 3/16 in the Grand Final was his best performance of the year with the ball but he also showed us what he is capable of with the bat, scoring a much needed 21 under pressure in the semi-final vs Parramatta. Claude now has a solid understanding on the expectations of being a Manly rep player and should be very happy with his performances this season.



Myles Nockolds

Myles would bowl all day if he was allowed to and was once again a key member of our bowling attack. After a few off-season technical tweaks such as staying taller at the point of delivery and following through the crease, Myles enjoyed a successful haul of 11 wickets at an average of 14.3, landing him 10th in the overall NSWYC wicket tally. Myles was thrown the new ball on a few occasions this season and regularly got us off to a great start with either an early wicket or a miserly economic spell. One of the highlights for Myles this year was the absolute screamer of a diving catch he took running in at full throttle from the square leg boundary....catch of the season! Another noticeable area of improvement for Myles this year was his confidence to try some variations such as slower balls, in-swingers and to use the crease more, all skills to keep developing for next season.

Sam Roche

At the start of the season Sam was selected in the shadow squad but was actually called up to play 5 games throughout the season due to various injuries. Sam's attitude and work ethic is second to none and he was determined to show us all, in his own humble way, that he should have been in the squad in the first place. Sam is an example of how hard work, persistence, good attitude will lead to opportunity and he played key roles, especially in the big games (Semi-Final and Grand Final). Even in games when he didn't get a wicket he beat the bat regularly and was extremely economical (4 overs for 4 runs on 2 separate occasions). Hopefully Sam now has the belief that he can compete at this level and we look forward to him continuing his development and playing a more prominent role for Manly in years to come.

2020 Ballina Under 13 Carnival Undefeated Champions

With the start of the new Youth Championships being run by Cricket NSW the metro competition was split into Sixers and Thunder groups. The eastern half of the metro area were drawn in the Sixers group and to say it was a tough one would be an understatement. Arguably six of the best eight teams in Sydney were in our group. You could look at that in one of two ways, it was going to be tough to get out of the group

and reach the finals or it was great to be testing ourselves against the best players and teams in Sydney.

We had a number of new players join the team this year. Preston Lee, Sourav Holla, Luke Watts, Jack Donnan, Angus McGrath and Ollie Goldsworthy had all impressed in the Presos and were rewarded with a call up. Unfortunately, both Preston and Sourav suffered nasty injuries in pre-season and were unable to play in the competition games.

After a good pre-season (other than the injuries), including a number of practice matches we went in to the competition looking forward to the challenges ahead.

The first two rounds were both T20 games against teams from the Thunder group and we travelled out to Hawkesbury to play the hosts and Blacktown under a perfect blue sky.

Winning the toss, we batted first against Hawkesbury and got off to a flyer with Will Brewster and Harry O'Sullivan (20) opening. Will scoring 29 of 19 balls ensured we hit



50 by the 5th over setting ourselves up for a big score. As often happens the run rate slowed as we lost a few wickets but debutant Luke Watts (26) hitting a flurry of boundaries saw us to a solid 5-137.

When you think you have scored enough you can soon find yourself nervously checking the scoreboard as the Hawkesbury opener cleared the fence and the road six times in a blistering innings of 69. A great catch by Angus McGrath on the boundary off Ethan ended the chase but an early lesson to the boys of the sort of talent we would be up against this season. Hawkesbury finishing on 3-111.

Game 2 was on the adjoining pitch against Blacktown who would go on to make the semi-finals. Batting first again, Will Brewster (27) continued where he left off hitting a couple of maximums as we again passed 50 in the 5th over. Ethan Buchanan (78) then took over and in partnership with Luke Watts (33) destroyed the bowling with big hitting and excellent running between the wickets. Ethan hit one six that flew in to the car park and somehow missing everything. Our total of 3-157 was always going to be a big ask of any team against our attack and with Tom Cole at his best picking up 4-15 the game was over by the tenth over. Blacktown finishing on 6-82.

So, two good wins in the short version but it wasn't going to get any easier as we took on North Shore in Round 3 in the 40 over format.

North Shore are a very talented team with a number of stand out players in the competition. Over the last few seasons we have had a number of great games but this turned out to be as about as close as you can get.

North Shore won the toss and decided to bat in what had been a very wet week. Playing at Nolan's 1 as Harbord Park was drenched, the ground was in surprisingly good shape. We needed a good start in order to not let the powerful NS top order get away. Lewis Whiley bowled superbly as he did for the rest of the season knocking over two wickets in one over. Alongside Tom Cole, they had NS struggling after the opening spells were completed. Ethan and Will picked up 3 more wickets and Tom Molloy was at his miserly best and with a few overs to go NS were 6-111. Unfortunately, a few loose overs at the end allowed NS to scrape to 6-132 at the close and although we would have taken that at the start it was probably a dozen more than it should have been.

In reply, Harry O'Sullivan (35) and Tom Molloy battled hard against some fiery opening bowling and did well to hang in there but our run rate was stuck in the 2's and pressure was building. As became the problem for most of the season we seemed to lose wickets in clumps which makes partnership building very hard. From 0-36 we slumped to 3-41 and then from 3-65 we folded again to 7-74, against some top

bowling to be fair, but we have to find ways to keep the scoreboard moving in difficult moment in the game.

Amongst the carnage, Jack Donnan (26*) in his first game for the team and Tom Cole (18) hung in and started to right the ship. With fielding restrictions requiring a number of catchers and boundary riders, the gaps started to appear and singles were coming more frequently. The partnership was putting pressure on the NS attack and they were really struggling to find a way through in a game that looked theirs for all money. When Tom fell, we were still a long way from home at 9-106 and it seemed only a matter of time. But all wicket keepers can bat 😊 and so when Zac O'Sullivan (11*) joined Jack they continued to get bat on ball and take every single on offer. If you can get a game to the last over you have a chance and we did that somehow only requiring six to win. Easier said than done when the rate has never been above three all day. Any chance of holding on to your nails until round 4 were gone as the boys took it all the way down to the last ball. 2 to win - all three results possible. Jack got a good piece of it and it was in the gap and it was through surely, but no it hit a Nolan's tuft and plugged! The boys scampered through for a single and the game was Tied! Neither side knew whether to be happy or disappointed but in the end it was a fitting result for an incredible game. Jack finished 26* and appeared to be the calmest man on the ground playing a very mature innings in the circumstances.

Round 4 was away at Hornsby who had played in the previous year's Grand Final, beating us off the last ball on the way. Another tough day in store.

Batting first we put in a performance that becoming frustratingly common. One after another our batsmen got in and got out, often in bizarre fashion completely forgetting the art of picking up ones and twos and waiting for the genuinely bad ball to put away. Ethan Buchanan top scored with (29) and we needed a few cameos from Whiley, McGrath and Cole as we were bowled out in 38th over for 149.

We needed to bowl well against a solid batting line up and it was our seam bowlers that did the damage this time around. Lewis Whiley (2-26) again unnerved the openers with his pace and bounce and along with Tom Cole (1-14) had Hornsby under the pump. Will Brewster produced an excellent spell (3-16) along with Ethan Buchanan (2-30) and a couple of runouts saw us dismiss Hornsby for 132 in 37th over. Our bowling and fielding was again high quality but we need to bat better if we are going to go further in the competition.

Round 5 saw us out at Maroubra to play South Eastern a team we have struggled to beat for some reason. Any thoughts of changing that stat were blown away by another carbon copy of an innings with the bat although probably even worse. 5 players made double figures with no one going past 25. Luke Watts (24) top scoring. A procession of poor shots when seemingly in control was frustrating for us all.

Our bowlers had dug us out before and while we made South Eastern work hard, two of their batsmen showed the willingness to stick it out. Lewis Whiley was immense again with 2-14 off 8 overs along with Tom Molloy 2-16 off 7 in another very tidy spell of off spin bowling. Eshaan Holla (1-13) chipped in dismissing their best batsman but it was too big a task in the end with South Eastern getting home 7-134 with two overs remaining. There is no lack of batting talent in this team, but we have to be prepared to work harder against the quality of bowling attacks we are up against. It is fair to say Saturday morning cricket is no preparation but that's for another day.

Round 6, and we needed a big day out with the bat to get ourselves back on track. Northern Districts had been struggling so this was probably our chance. Unfortunately, the weather looked as though it would play a part and with a draw probably seeing us exit the finals we decided to field first.

Maybe expecting to bowl ND's out cheaply we weren't at our best and although no one bowled badly we were going through the motions a little bit. Whiley, Cole,





Buchanan and Molloy all picked up a brace of wickets as we eventually dismissed ND's in the 40th over for 121. The boys saw an opportunity for a bonus point by getting the runs within 20 overs and with Will Brewster (22) promoted to open with Harry O'Sullivan (37) we got off to a flying start, Will falling with the score at 31. If you want to score quickly its handy to have Ethan Buchanan coming in at 3 and his quick fire 50 with six fours saw us home in the 15th over. It didn't rain but it did on the way home so maybe it was the right call after all.

Round 7 saw us away again at last year's DCA Champions Inner West Harbour, another talented side. Winning the toss, we batted first and had the worst possible start losing Harry and Ethan cheaply. Will Brewster and Luke Watts were moving the score along nicely and then both fell caught behind within a couple of overs. It looked like it was going the same way as most of our other innings but a partnership of note at last (79) between Captain Tom Molloy (34) and Jack Donnan (47) got us back on track. Both boys running well between the wickets and putting away the few loose balls. Again though, they both departed in quick succession as did the next couple of wickets and the recovery had been undone. Ollie Goldsworthy who had not had many opportunities to date played a good cameo at the back end of our innings but again we were bowled out with the score on 157.

We needed to bowl well, and we did, but it took a while to break the opening partnership at 33. Once we did the wickets came consistently. Whiley and Brewster removed the openers and then Ethan who had not been at his best with the ball so far ripped through the middle order taking 3-13. Both spinners were excellent, Tom Molloy 2-23 and Eshaan Holla 2-6 along with some great fielding ensured we bowled out the champions for 110 in the 35th over. Again, not a great batting performance but a morale boosting win nevertheless.

The next round was a rare home game against St. George, a game we knew we could rack up some runs if we got the chance. We didn't. St. George won the toss and batted first. Will Brewster 3-8 removed the top order and while we struggled to blow them away we eventually ended the St. George innings on 67 in 38th over. All the bowlers were on the money, Tom Molloy 2-13, Jack Donnan 2-10 and Eshaan Holla being the pick.

Angus McGrath was promoted to open and whacked a quick 31 in some style and the game was won in 14th over. An early mark and a trip to Freshie.

We still needed some runs and the two games we could expect to get them we had chased low scores. Our final group game was against another strong outfit in Sutherland.



Sutherland won the toss and batted first. Whiley and Brewster opened the bowling and both had the Sutherland openers locked up with runs few and far between. Wicket were also hard to come by and a couple of solid partnerships kept the scoring moving. At 3-93 the game was in the balance but a great second spell from Whiley (4-16) as well as good spells from Watts and Holla kept the brakes on with Sutherland being bowled out for 133 in 39th over.

Even with the way we had batted this year 134 was well within our reach and one we would expect to get nine times out of ten, this was the tenth!

Four batsman made 20 plus but none made it to 40. Harry O'Sullivan (36) hung in there and built a cameo partnership with Luke Watts (21). Tom Molloy (21*) was looking good and was getting back to his best and in a partnership with Lewis Whiley (20) looked like they would get us home but again we failed to bat our overs and were rolled for a paltry 113 in 38th over. Our boys looked great in the nets but we couldn't make it count in the middle. It seems that young players are more interested in strike rates these days - I wonder where they get that from.

It seemed that we were finished for the season as we were relying on other results but Hornsby did a favour and knocked over South Eastern so we grabbed the final ticket out of the Sixers group. No mean feat to be fair in a group full of strong sides.

The semi-final saw us up against Parramatta, easily the strongest team in the Thunder group.

We won the toss and that was all.

A big and fired up Parramatta were simply too good for us on the day. Only Tom Molloy (39) back to his best and Ethan Buchanan (22) offered any resistance and their partnership gave us brief hope but as we have all season, we lost wickets in clumps and never recovered. 109 was never going to be enough and while, as we have done all season, bowled and fielded with a lot of heart we couldn't keep the pressure on as the field restrictions kicked in. All the bowlers bowled well and it took Parramatta to the 36th over to cross the line but we knew we were well beaten.

Our batting let us down all season and we never passed 160 in any of our 9 round matches. Having said that it's not lack of ability but a lack of thought. While we encourage positive batting, there are times when the bowlers are on top and you have to dig in, build a partnership and watch how the momentum swings. We just didn't do it enough and yet still made the semi-final so we have hope for future seasons if we can get that right.

North Shore were victors in the final and deservedly so as they are the best side. We proved in Round 3 that we can match it with them and that should give us hope going forward.

Ballina Carnival

There is no doubt that the Lismore and Ballina carnivals are the highlights of the Under 12 and Under 13 season as so we took the long trip North with excitement and looking forward to getting our batting back on track.

It's a beautiful part of the world and the weather was perfect. The opportunity to play on turf and against new opposition from Regional NSW and Queensland was a great experience for the boys.

Our first game was against the Brisbane Bears out at Lennox Head across the road from the surf which gave us a bit of respite on a warm day. Batting first, our innings was anchored by Ollie Goldsworthy (65) and Lewis Whiley (53*), two popular members of the team who while very different in styles complimented each other well with their first half centuries for Manly. A number of cameos saw us reach a commanding 6/260 off 46 overs. In reply and in soaring temperatures the boys stuck to their task well limiting the Bears to 8/182 in their 46 overs. All the boys bowled well with the pick being Tom Cole with 3-28.

Day 2 on turf we played Hunter Valley and again were able to win the toss and have a bat. Not many of our boys get to bat on turf with any regularity so it was pleasing to see the boys play straight and get forward and with a positive mind set. Tom Cole (48), Tom Molloy (31) and a superb display of power hitting from Ethan Buchanan (87*) who made a mockery of the slow outfield and the 80m boundary saw us reach a score of 260 for the second day in a row.

In reply Will Brewster (2-6) got the early poles to set us up for a resounding win. Eshaan Holla looked far more at home on a 20m wicket and turf to return 3-5 along with Molloy 2-10 and Goldsworthy with



2-2 bowling his little skidders. Hunter Valley out in the 27th over for 60. Back to the hotel for a long cool off in the pool while the parents also took in some refreshments.

Day 3 was another new opponent in Mid North Coast back on the synthetic at Lennox Head. We were looking for another statement from the boys with the bat and they did just that with Jack Donnan and Tom Molloy posting half centuries before retiring to the shade. A number of cameos kept the score moving quickly including an entertaining innings from our resident number 11, Zac O'Sullivan, who scored a very accomplished (40*) to see us reach an imposing 8/289 off our 43 overs. The O'Sullivan twins batted together for the first time causing some anxiety in the scorer's tent!

Ethan and Tom knocked over the top order and the spinners mopped up the rest with Harry O'Sullivan returning career best figures of 3-15. Mid North Coast finishing all out 125 in 31st over.

Day 4 was semi-final day back on turf and we knew the competition would lift a few notches from the first three days. Tours like this are great but it is a real test of stamina for the boys especially in the heat. We were up against Lake Macquarie a team that seemed to encompass players from a wide area!

Batting first, our innings will be remembered for a high quality and powerful century from Ethan Buchanan (132*) containing 17 fours on what was a big ground. On a hot day, his ability to not only play big shots but also take all the ones, twos and threes on offer and keep his head while wickets were falling around him was impressive. It's





important for the boys to learn how to bat with someone who is batting in that way, don't try to copy just work with them and build those partnerships. In the end, it was an excellent lower order stand with Lewis Whiley (35) that saw us reach 8/269.

I would have bet my house and car that the total was easily enough, fortunately I'm not a betting man!

While we did ultimately win the game the Lake Macquarie innings will also be remembered for an exceptional innings. With Will Brewster having picked up the opener and number three we looked good but a stand of 89 put us on the back foot and at times looking helpless to stem the flow of runs. The innings of Wilson (95) was one of the best I have seen in junior cricket and based on the fact it was against a very good bowling side. He hit with the power of someone much older and with superb placement.

In the end credit to our boys for holding their nerve. Lewis removed the opener who had also made 50 and Tom Molloy got one through the defences of Wilson to the relief of us all. Who else but Ethan rammed home the advantage collecting 4 quick wickets to see us home with Lake Macquarie all out for 210. It doesn't look close but it was touch and go for a long time.

The final was at the lovely Fripp Oval against the local Far North Coast team that had surprisingly knocked over North Shore the day before.

The wicket was the same as the previous day and we knew that it was going to be slow and difficult to score quickly on. Straight bowling with a ring field had accounted for North Shore so we knew what was coming, could we deal with it?

Winning the toss again we decided to bat first and get a score on the board. We lost Harry and Tom early against some accurate bowling but the game changed upon Ethan's arrival to the crease. There were some close calls early on but once he got into his rhythm he played an even better innings than the day before. Not as many runs but a better attack on a tricky wicket showed great maturity for a 13-year-old. In partnership with Jack Donnan who has had a very promising first season in the Div 1 team, they put on 73 for the third wicket, Jack making an excellent and very patient 53. Ethen kept going in a 68-run partnership with Luke Watts (19) who did the right thing and stuck in there even though it wasn't easy and it was almost a surprise when Ethan fell on 81. In the conditions and on the occasion, it really was a great innings, if he can use that as a blueprint for himself with the way he played himself in and then raised the tempo consistently through his innings he will make a lot of runs.

The rest of our innings was slightly comical with horrible hacks and run outs that showed how hard it was to lift the tempo on this wicket. In the end, we made 197

which seemed short of what we should have got, but in reality, it was a match winning total.

In the end, once Lewis had removed their star batsman, they struggled with the accuracy of our bowling and the quality of our fielding that strangled them to finish all out for exactly 100. All the boys bowled well; the standout was Tom Molloy with 4-15 of his 8 overs. Brewster, Watts and Goldsworthy all picked up two apiece in an impressive showing.

Ethan picked up a swag of trophies for being the best at, well everything really! He had a great week with the bat. Tom Molloy lifted the shield to end a great week of cricket for the team.

We all had a great week to be fair, it's a lovely spot, the weather was great, and all the boys and families get on so well. The support for the team on the field from the team off the field was immense all season.

I'd like to thank my co-coach Paul O'Sullivan in his comeback year for his valuable input and organisation at training. To Zia for her management duties and just making sure everything was just done.

A really enjoyable year, and although we still have lots to do to get to where we want to be I have no doubt we are within touching distance of the top sides and if our batting comes together we will get there.

2019/20 NSW Youth Championships Under 13 Division 2 Champions

The Under 13 Division 2 side was full of talented cricketers. Many had tasted Premiership victories the previous two seasons and had returned ready for the threepeat. There was also a compliment of boys starting their Manly Rep careers and ready to join the winning ways. The season kicked off with a T20 double header at Inner West Harbour. In the first fixture top-order regular Dusty Labador showed off his class with an unbeaten half-century (53*). It was the start the team was looking for. Dusty

would also anchor another 50-run partnership in round 3 and continue to be the top-order 'rock' that gave the team it's batting character and confidence.

Jack Donnan came, punished the Sutherland and North Shore bowling attacks and was promptly elevated to Division 1. The superiority he showed with the bat in the pre-season and first 2 games had everyone very excited about how many runs he was destined to blunder in Div 2. But it was not to be. Division 1 was calling, and Jack was more than ready.

One of the discoveries of the season was Josh Pearson. The wiry quick had been selected in the shadow squad, but injuries and player movement meant he would get his chance to sling a few thunderbolts down at some thoroughly unprepared opposition batsmen. In round 3 against the highly touted Inner West Harbour Josh's natural in-swing and steep bounce snared 4 wickets (4-24) in combination with Archie Rochford's leg-spin (4-20) Inner west Harbour always had a battle on their hands.

Jack Toohey's steady consistency and versatility was a cornerstone for the team all season. His 37* and 4-29 against North Shore in round 5 was a great example of his skill with both bat and ball. Throughout the season Benji Cook had proven his value as a whippet in the field and between the wickets. His ability to save runs and then score doubled his impact every game. In round seven against top of the table Parramatta his 30 from just 36 balls won the game. Against a team of towering opponents, many



easily nudging or over the six-foot mark, Benji showed the heart and fearlessness that makes him such an invaluable teammate.

Another two additions to the team, James and Heath, would both reach their high points in the final. Firstly, it was the man with the gloves, Heath Gordon. In round 3 he would score an unbeaten 38*, building in confidence with the bat to compliment an exceptional season behind the stumps. By the time of the Grand Final Heath was ready to show everyone just how much of a game-changer he could be. His 4 dismissals including 3 stumpings in the final would earn him the Player of the Grand Final award. It was no fluke that Heath would have such an impact in the GF, it was the result of a season of hard work and perseverance from a player who work ethic was second to none. While Heath was busy removing the bails, James Olde was producing an extraordinary spell of leg-spin brilliance. It was his time to shine and shine he did. His 3 fa had batsmen contemplating kicking over their own stumps to put an end to the embarrassment. It was the spell his entire team he knew he could produce, sharp turn, dip and bounce. And he saved it for the perfect moment.



The final round against Bankstown would see the coming out party for another new player, who's willingness to work hard saw him secure his position as one of the teams opening batsmen. Cooper Swinney's 51 was brilliant to watch, punishing anything on the legside, and given the length of the grass at Passmore that day it would easily have been 75+ on any other ground. Throughout the entire season, Cooper showed a level of patience and character that any opening batsmen, at any level would envy. His unmatched enthusiasm and passion for the game shone bright throughout the season no matter the scenario.

With so many strong returning and new players proving their worth at different times in the season it was the consistent excellence of a few of the veterans, Will and Zach, that was the oil that kept the team's engine running

smoothly. Will Read's natural outswing was far too good for the majority of opposition batsmen. Whether it was pushing uphill or charging in with the wind at his back, Will always did his job. His nagging off-stump line drew more plays and misses than any other bowler in the team. And the unfortunate reality for Will was in most cases the batsmen just weren't good enough to nick it.

Zach Buchanan had one of the moments of the season, a hat-trick that had players and spectators running in all directions in delight. Penrith had travelled to Harbord Park and fancied their chances against a team coming off its first loss in two seasons. But Zach had different plans, 3 balls 3 wickets followed by celebratory madness. Finishing with 4-13 it was a special moment for a deserving player. Starting the season batting at number 3, shifting to open the bowling by the end and snaring some brilliant catches in the slips, the hat-trick was the cherry on top of a cracking season for Zach.

On reaching the finals the lads were ready, and it would take a whole team effort with a few special moments to ultimately lift the shield high, victorious. Facing Bankstown in the Semi's having beaten them the week earlier created a new challenge for the boys to overcome, complacency. The brilliant team win was highlighted by Archie's 4-21. Throughout the season his leg-spin had proven to be a challenge that many batsmen weren't prepared for. Turning it from outside leg to outside off made for some interesting shots. One of those shots led the catch of the season. Skipper Robbie Tipton at cover laying out horizontally to his left to hold a catch like no other. His father Simon was heard to exclaim, "did you see that catch?!". For those that had, the answer was "Yes, but I don't believe it!"

It was on to the final and the "3-peat" was in reach. Paramatta stood between Manly and another title. After an early batting collapse, many were already thinking that maybe 3 in a row was too much to ask. But not the Manly boys, one thing this team never lacked all season was character, and a belief that no matter what, they were never out of the game. Enter the 'little general', Angus Williams, ready to do battle again like he had done all season. Against easily the quickest bowler in the competition Angus stood his ground, digging out yorkers and swaying under bouncers. His patience and skill was on display once again as Manly began to fight their way back into the game. His 19 was masterful, and in partnership with captain courageous, Tipton, he had steered Manly back in front.

Robbie's innings of 38 in the Grand Final was just another brilliant moment in a brilliant season. To list them all would be difficult, and it's not an understatement to say that the team stop being surprised by his consistent performances. The 2019/20 season was one of highs and lows for the under 14s, with some truly dominant team and individual performances mixed in with some disappointing days of cricket. We saw many moments of individual brilliance (often numerous in the same match) and the culmination of multiple seasons of hard work paying off, but at crucial moments we just weren't able to pull together as a team and work hard to pull off the win when the going got tough.

A report like this can be a struggle. It's often hard to balance the innumerable positives to have come out of the season with the feelings of disappointment about the season

that could've been, had we started the season playing the cricket that we finished it with. The shrewdness of our fielding and bowling performance in our final game against Sutherland was a case in point. Our bowling and fielding plans, and the way we stuck to them was what got us over the line in a very hotly contested match; both on and off the pitch. Unfortunately, this game was also somewhat representative of our season, as it seemed that playing our best in one aspect of the game only ever came out when we had somewhat let ourselves down in another area of the game. Against Sutherland this was our batting, and it was only an extremely patient and mature 10th wicket partnership between Billy Kwan and Josh Lawson that kept us in the hunt and gave us something to bowl at.

Unfortunately for us cricket is the ultimate game of consistency, and despite some truly comprehensive wins, at crucial moments against the tougher teams we just weren't able to play our best cricket. If we want to dominate the competition like we are capable of we all need to work on our individual skills and our ability to execute them. Then as a team we need to band together in those crucial moments in the tight matches to be just that little bit tougher mentally than our opponents. That will be our goal next season. The highlight of the season for me was the visible development of the boys throughout the season, especially those who are putting in the hard work. The successes of boys like Toby, Roop and Andrew in not just making, but excelling in their respective Grade and Green Shield games this season is a testament



to the hard work that they are putting in. Similarly, it was brilliant to see the hard-working Josh Lawson and Bailey Foster, who shone in his debut DCA/Youth Championship season, rewarded by selection in the State Challenge. The dedication and sheer time that these boys put into their cricket is impressive and as was clear this season - it continues to pay off. The best illustration of this is Josh Lawson's ongoing application to improving his batting. He has taken a skill that used to be one of his weaknesses and worked his backside off at it. At the time of writing he's hit two fifties on the trot.

Even more worthy of mention in my opinion (especially given the lack of coverage by Manly's well-oiled social media machine) is the success of boys like Billy Kwan. After a tough start to the year in reps where the pace of boys like Toby and Josh was challenging him technically as a keeper, he went away and worked at it. He improved throughout the remainder of the season until at the Newcastle Carnival he received the award for fielder of the carnival. Billy's batting at that carnival (where he also won the Player of the Tournament Award) was also a revelation and showcased perfectly how important it is to know your game as a batsman. The bowling antics of Jack Slater also can't go without mention. In the game where he took a hat-trick, Jack bowled one of the best spells of leg-spin I've seen at any level of cricket. As a former leg-spin battler myself, I can confirm that it is exceedingly difficult to get 6 wickets in one innings. And it is even rarer AGAIN for them to all be genuine, outstanding deliveries. I mean, you're almost guaranteed that one of them will be a fully or a half-tracker. But no. This was one such occasion and Jack's figures of 6-9 are an accurate reflection of the way he bowled. Jake Hutchings' bowling both at the carnival and throughout the



season was also on show, managing to bring down the run rate and build pressure at vital moments in important matches. The work of the slips cordon this season - comprised of Jack Slater, Arjun Chakravarty, Andrew Boulton (when he felt tired) and Jeremy Scarf in gully - was also fantastic to see. It's a tough gig but the practice the boys are getting there will continue to translate into wickets for the team. And who can forget Arjun's screamer off Toby at Mike Pawley Oval?! Sadly, perhaps a number of people, as a mistimed toilet break led me to discover that a few onlookers had also unfortunately had their attention

elsewhere, but by all reports IT WAS A RIPPER!

Luke Burgess' leadership at the Newcastle carnival was also a revelation. He led the boys in the field as he'd done all year, while his bowling was a class above most of the batsmen he faced and his batting showed a new maturity. With the unfortunate loss of Jeremy Scarf, whose energy and enthusiasm in the field was an asset all season (and subsequently hydration technician Ben) to injury late in the piece, the stage was set for a 50/50 Presos/Youth Championship split for the Newcastle carnival. The way the two teams came together both on the field and off the field was just fantastic to see and a testament to the excellent coaching of Steve Thompson and the parenting skills of every single one of the boys' parents.

The way Gus McConnell, Jake, Jack, Billy, Arjun and of course Luke stepped up at various stages throughout the tournament was also really great to see. Gus McConnell (although playing slightly injured at time) was a handful whenever his back allowed him to get the ball in hand and I was particularly impressed with his leadership in the fast bowling department. Overall, the carnival was an overwhelming success. It blew me away to see that the cricketing development I had witnessed in the Youth Championship boys had taken place just as much during the season for the President's Cup boys. I can already see that selections next year will be fascinating, but bloody difficult.

Cricket is the ultimate game of consistency, and it tests the resilience of players like no other. For those boys who weren't happy with their season this year I have some

advice. Set yourself a goal and plan out what you need to do to achieve it. If you don't know what that is, ask your club coach or one of the many coaches that Manly is so fortunate to have. If you put the work in, the runs and wickets will follow. If you catch and field enough balls you will make yourself an asset in the field - something that I can personally attest has been the difference in selections for many a cricketer over the years (including me in this age group many years ago). With goals set and clear plans to achieve them the selections and other opportunities will naturally follow. Lastly, and somewhat counter-intuitively when compared to all the technical stuff that seems to make up cricket, you need to find a way to keep enjoying your cricket. If you're not waking up on Saturday



and Sunday more excited than any other day, there might be a problem.

Finally, I simply would not have been able to do this job without the support of the parents who have entrusted me with coaching their kids at what is a highly competitive level of cricket. In particular, mention must go to the many parents who (occasionally thanklessly at times from the boys) prepared beautiful lunches, the various parents who toiled on the score book, Paula Burgess for her photography, Lloyd Burgess for his sociable and ever-punctual chauffeuring service, the numerous parents who helped me out at trainings and warm-ups (especially Harj Dhillon and Steve Thompson up at Newcastle) and all the parents who engineered their entire families' schedules to get their boys to trainings and games. Without your tireless efforts, the boys simply couldn't keep devoting the amount of time they do to the sport they love. Finally, of course, there is the wizard himself, Michael Kwan. Words can never do justice to how appreciative I am, and I'm sure ALL the parents are, for the incredible time, energy and sheer organisational prowess that he contributes year in and year out. Watching the Kwan-mobile roll up at a ground of a morning and watching sleek setup operation commence is truly a sight to behold.

As mentioned above, I'm really looking forward to next season - with the lessons from this season under our belt we'll be back hungrier, stronger and tougher than ever to fight for some silverware. Sadly, I can guarantee that the boys will also be smellier, so pack some extra deodorant for the long car rides home.

In summary, it was a season that promised so much but never really got going and full of lots of chasing leather. A couple of injuries to start the season didn't help with Marcus Campbell ruled out for the season before a ball was bowled however that gave Will Pavely an opportunity in DCA.

An impressive batting performance in the round 1 T20 match against Hawkesbury saw a more than competitive total posted of 135 with only the loss of 2 two wickets set up by a great 91 opening partnership between Josh Cooper and Ollie Kantor-Smith. Josh made 50, Billy O'Brien made a brisk 22 at number 3, and Ollie was agonisingly short of a 50 finishing 49 not out. Some tight bowling at the start and through the middle,



especially by spinners Josh, Will Marks and Cam Frost. Some sloppy fielding gave Hawkesbury a sniff before they finished on 3/121 after 20 overs. A positive start to the season with the boys confident going into the second T20 match against Blacktown.

Manly won the toss and elected to bat first in the second T20 match and unfortunately that was the best moment of the match. 46 all out at the end of 20 overs was never going to be anywhere near enough with the only real resistance coming from Toby Mallon with a score of 18. An early finish followed with none of the bowlers causing much trouble for the Blacktown openers.

With some rain and overcast skies around, Manly won the toss against North Shore in the round 3 match and elected to bowl first this time. Enter the North Shore openers who took the attack to every Manly bowler until it was finally broken with the score on 166. The chief destroyer for North Shore got 113 off 71 balls as he rode his luck swinging freely – he only managed 83 runs in his other 8 innings this season. Regular wickets fell after that as the run rate fell from 11 after 10 overs to 6 and Manly was left chasing 304 to win. A top order collapse though put end to any hopes of a win with the score being 5/15 at one stage. Milo May (27) and Joey Braund (17) steadied things a little before the lower order led by Harrison O'Brien with 45 not out to go with his 2 wickets scored a few runs to get Manly to 175 but still a disappointing significant loss.

Next match was at Barker College on what was a beautiful batting pitch. Hornsby batted first and put a massive score of 6/380 with some great flawless batting by their opener and number three in a 164-run partnership followed by some explosive batting by their middle order. Unfortunately, Manly never got any momentum with the bat with regular wickets falling despite Billy finding some form with 53. In the end, it was another big loss this time by 174 runs.

Up next was South Eastern with an ominous top order. South Eastern batted first who got off to a good start but never got away from Manly. Enter Manly's leg spin trio – Will Marks, Cam Frost and Joey Braund. Their varying mix of spin, flight and bounce dried up the runs and brought regular wickets. Will finished with 3/38 off his 10 overs, Cam 1/28 off his 10 and unlucky not to get more wickets and Joey got 2/24 off 4 overs bowling towards the end as South Eastern were looking to accelerate. With 2 run outs in the last few overs, Manly restricted South Eastern to 215 – seeing a 2 instead of a 3 was a big relief for the team and the boys were positive this could be chased. Openers Josh and Ollie got the team off to a great start with a 103-run partnership with Ollie just short of 50 again with 46. Regular wickets began falling as the required run rate crept upwards. Josh eventually fell for a well compiled 81. With Milo still at the crease, Manly still believed they could win as the run rate got above 7. However, a stunning one handed catch on the boundary ended Milo's innings – there are no

words that can do that catch justice. Manly eventually fell agonisingly short on 7/210 after 50 overs but now had a bit more belief after a more positive result.

Round 6 was against Northern District – 7th v 8th place. Sent in to field first, Manly was able to bowl tightly for the most part and take regular wickets as the fast bowlers found their line and length on a more consistent basis. Wickets were spread with Cam and Ollie both getting two and Harrison bowling very tight and deserving of a few more wickets than the one he got. However, the highlight was definitely Billy's first DCA wicket as he backed up all the talk he has given to every coach he has had about how good his bowling is. In chasing, Manly got off to a good start with an 111 partnership for the second wicket before Billy fell for 50 backing up his bowling effort. Ollie continued on before falling for 72, finally getting the 50 he deserved, as the game started tightening up. A couple of important cameos by Will Pavely and Toby got Manly home 7 down with 7 balls to spare.

A disappointing season had come to an end but had at least finished on a high. Thank you to Todd Marks for his help at training and game days and support throughout the season. Thanks to Helen Braund for taking on the unenviable role of manager this season. Thank you to all the parents for their support, scoring and amazing lunches – would have loved a few more home games just to enjoy a few more of our lunches.

To the players, thank you for your efforts throughout the season. Whilst we didn't achieve the success we had hoped for, there were still some positive moments for each of you and some lessons for your cricket and life in general going forward. I would also like to thank Keelan Mendel, Toby Seward and Charlie Johnston for filling in at various stages in the season.

Behind every successful team is a collaborative parent group! Phil 'wonder-manager' Johnston and I were very lucky to have a group of parents who were helpful, supportive and encouraging. This formed the foundation of a successful season.

There were interruptions at the front of the season due to players moving in and out of the DCA team and one team member withdraw due to injury. This created an opportunity for Harry Last to come into the team, and what a great inclusion he was! He wasn't the only new inclusion into the team with Aidan Hogan, Ed Hutt and Keelan Mendel also new to the team.

The team also self-selected captains and vice captains which ended up being our 'leadership group'. It was a fantastic opportunity for Charlie Johnston, Toby Seward, Keelan Mendel, Whiley Toll and Mitch Gilligan to lead and influence this fine group of young men!

The emphasis this season was on fitness, fielding, playing positive cricket and enjoying the experience of representing Manly, which eventuated into a successful formula, being undefeated after the round games and only losing one game which was on a knife's edge right up until the last minute.

We had 3 warm up games, the first was against Maitland in Maitland, then Sutherland in Sutherland and finally the Manly Under 16 Presos at Grahams. This was a great opportunity for the boys to start using what they had been practicing at training. Maitland's drought-stricken outfield and 30+ degrees was an impressive first up challenge. Some standouts were Charlie Johnston's 46, Luke Smith & Whiley Toll's 25 each, Aidan Hogan on debut got 3 wickets for 16 off 6 overs and Sentarou Murata-



Davison 2 wickets for 17 off 8 overs.

The Sutherland game also had some stand out performances including Keelan's 59 not out, Luke's 2 for 11 off 3 overs and Sentarou's unforgettable 5-fa (including a hat-trick) for 9 runs off 5 overs.

The final warm up game against the powerful Manly U16 Preso game was a great learning experience for the boys and, also the first of 4 games which Toby Seward was out due to a broken wrist. Charlie matched their power with a strong 48 with the bat, Liam Toole (our replacement for Toby) made an impressive 37 (retired), Sentarou got another 3 wickets and our all-rounder/wicket keeper Whiley Toll got 3 for 20 off 3 overs!



Although it felt like our season was coming to an end after a long pre-season, our first-round game was against North Shore who batted first and put on an impressive 220. Nothing like scoreboard pressure in the first game! The boys really showed some team spirit passing North Shore's total with a few overs to spare. Luke, Sen and Charlie all contributed 20+ each and Keelan & Ryan put on a 100+ partnership (Keelan 53 no and Ryan 60) to seal a round one win.

In round two we faced Maitland again but this time on home soil. Batting first, Keelan, Mitch and Sentarou all got 42 runs and the innings was finished off perfectly by Ed Hutt and Kia Connors with a 30-run partnership. We defended our total brilliantly headed by Mitch Gilligan's 5-fa (5-30 off 10 overs) and Sen's 2 for 12 off 8 overs, a great win.

This final game before the Christmas break was against Blacktown at good old Whalan Reserve! At Whalan I think of heat and flies and it didn't let us down. Blacktown batted first and Mitch did it again with 4 for 22 off 10 overs, outstanding! Harry also chipped

in with 2 for 22 off 7. We started slowly with the bat until Charlie came in with a quick fire 26 and Keelan's 63 not out got us across the line.

3 from 3 was a great way to head into the Christmas break!

It was very clear that the 6-week break did us no favours and we were very rusty to say the least...

Round 4 was against Parramatta at home and saw the return of Toby Seward, one of the leadership group, from his broken wrist. We batted first, with the top 5 all contributing and getting a start but all were out caught! It was great to see Luke finishing on a quick fire 28 not out. Our quicks pinned them down from the start with Aidan 0 for 9 off 4 overs and Kia Connors 0 for 15 off 6, Mitch started off where he finished pre Chrissy with 4 for 27 off 10 overs and our part-time spinner Ryan Lynch bagged 3 for 28 off 7 overs to bowl Parra out 50 runs short.

Round 5 was against last placed Hurricanes but disappointedly, the weather got the better of us when the Sydney dry spell broke. This meant that we were unbeaten during the normal rounds and we headed into the semis full of confidence.



Our semi was against Parramatta (again) who came into the game with a very different mindset. They bowled out of their skin and restricted us to 150. Keelan, Charlie and Toby all got in the 30's and without the great finishing of Ed and Kai, with their lightning fast running between the wickets, we wouldn't have made it to that total. This was the first real time that the boys had been put under pressure all season, and it was the first real time their true team spirit and character came out. We were up against it all innings but they were positive to each other and backed each right through to the last ball bowled. Even though we lost the game, I and the other parents were very proud of the way we played in the true spirit of the game.

Although the last game of the season against North Shore was an anticlimax, there were still some stand out performances. North Shore batted first and Harry Last saved his best till last. With the unbelievable figures of 6 wickets for 5 runs off 6.2 overs...North Shore were bowled out for 75 runs. Mitch and Charlie opened the batting, we achieved

the target with the loss of no wickets, Charlie unbeaten 42 and Mitch on 29.

I would say that we were the best team all season but it was the one percenters that let us down at the crucial times in the semis. In saying this, the boys grew, not just as cricketers but as individuals and as a team, as the season progressed.

There were many stand out performances including Mitch Gilligan, the star with the ball, with 18 wickets with an average of 9.17 and scoring 149 runs with the bat, Harry Last had a wonderful first season with 10 wickets at an average of 9.10, Keelan Mendel scored 211 runs at an average of 70, Charlie Johnston scored 149 with an average of 38 and Whiley Toll our wicket keeper took 7 catches behind the stumps.

Thank you to Mark Lynch who was our devoted scorer every week, Phil for his fantastic organisational skills and all the amazing parents for supporting the batting and bowling line ups throughout the season. When all the kids want to open the bowling and batting, it's the parents who equalize the team's culture...
