This season also saw the introduction of a new player management system call PlayHQ, that resulted in significant challenges for player registration, competition setup and statistics.

Thanks to the MWJCA Executive. MWJCA Committee, Rep Committee and Club delegates for all your efforts this season. Also, thanks to everyone who volunteered this season, especially the coaches, managers, scorers and other Club volunteers. Without your contributions, boys and girls would not be able to play cricket.

Junior Blasters



Junior Blasters is the entry-level cricket program, formerly known as In2CRICKET. Junior Blasters is designed for boys and girls from **5 to 8 years old** and gives participants a chance to take part in a variety of activities to develop cricket, physical fitness and social skills, sportsmanship and an understanding of the game of cricket. The emphasis is on fun and maximising participation.

The following clubs established a Junior Blasters program this season: **Beacon Hill, Collaroy Plateau, Harbord, Peninsula, Seaforth** and **Wakehurst**.

Master Blasters – Under 9 Cricket



Cricket Blast captures the colour and excitement of the Men's and Women's Big Bash League in a fun and fast format.

After learning all the basic skills in Junior Blasters, Master Blasters allows kids to experience modified games of cricket using lighter equipment in a format that is fast paced with equal participation. The program was developed to ensure junior cricketers can progress with confidence to Stage 1 of Junior Formats.

In line with Cricket Australia, Saturday Master Blasters was this year extended to boys and girls **under 9 years** of age with games played at a number of venues across the Northern Beaches within our existing club structure.

The MWJCA had the following Master Blasters centres on Saturday mornings:

- Lionel Watts, Frenchs Forest
 - Participating Clubs were Wakehurst and Forest with 8 Teams
- Beacon Hill Oval, Beacon Hill
 - Participating Clubs were Beacon Hill and Collaroy Plateau with 4 Teams
- Weldon, Curl Curl
 - Participating Club was Harbord with 6 Teams
- Seaforth Oval, Seaforth
 - Participating Club was Seaforth with 18 Teams

Master Blasters

Manly Mini Bash 10 - 2023



In February 2014 MWJCA introduced a T20 competition called “Manly Mini Bash” so that that young players could get an understanding of T20 at a young age to become better, well-rounded players and great T20 players of the future. The tournament was successful and received a lot of very positive feedback from both players and parents. In light of that, the tournament has continued to run and is now in its tenth year.

Some of the driving principles underpinning Manly Mini Bash are that participation comes ahead of winning, and that you play for enjoyment - winning is a bonus. Scores are not entered into PlayHQ so players tend to play in a more carefree manner purely for the fun of the game.

Once again it was run as a separate tournament and scores and results were not entered into PlayHQ. As it was wholly standalone from the Sat morning competition:

Match results had no impact on the Saturday morning league tables.

Player scores had no impact on individual player awards at the end of the season.

Match results and scores had no bearing on club championship points.

Structure

As usual, boy's teams from U11 Division 1 and above were invited to participate. Simon Martin from Harbord Devils Cricket Club managed the recruitment campaign again this year. MMB 10 was comprised of 9 leagues and because of the numbers of teams and the reduced ability to mix age groups (due to pitch lengths varying by age) we had to compromise on team numbers per league. The ideal number is 4 but we had the following:

Under 11/A (4 teams)

Under 11/C (4 teams)

Under 12/A (4 teams)

Under 12/C (3 teams)

Under 13-14/A (4 teams)

Under 14/A (5 teams)

Under 15-17/A (4 teams)

Under 11/B (5 teams)

Under 12/B (3 teams)

Once again, MWJCA provided bright orange & pink balls which not only help to differentiate from other cricket, but also have a very practical impact on visibility which is an important safety consideration with matches completing at 7:15pm.

Leagues with five teams should play four pool rounds with no semi-finals – after four rounds the top two teams play the final.

Summary

It was fantastic to get so many registrations this year & congratulations to all the teams that made the finals. Again we were hampered by a washout for the Tuesday & Thursday leagues in the first 2 weeks!

We decided to let 3v4 play an extra game due to the washouts, we just wanted everyone to get a few games in! Normally it would only be the teams who made the finals that would play.

Big congratulations to Cruz Cruickshank for scoring the most runs in the round games, scoring 123 runs & to Angus Williams for coming 2nd with 96 runs. Well done to them both.

It was great to get Ollie Davies & Jack Edwards down to umpire the finals on Tuesday night, along with some other Manly players. We were also fortunate to get Phill Edwards to make a guest Umpire visit for the Thursday finals, which he said he was very impressed with the standard (U11/C), well done to both teams!

Thank you all for supporting the BBQ after the games, the funds raised go towards caps & balls for next year.

On that note, I will be looking to hand over for next year, but happy to assist to make it a smooth change! I also think it may be a good idea to have a small group to share the load. Please, please consider contacting me to ensure this FUN competition continues to exist for the kids to enjoy playing a short format of the game we all love.

I'd like to thank Craig Schneidereit again this year who did the draw & ground allocation! No easy job, with grounds at a premium this time of year.

We thank everyone for their support and participation over the last 10 years and hope that next year is bigger & better than ever.

We would also like to see boys' teams inviting more girls to join their teams for MMB.

Summary

Fantastic to have an uninterrupted season of cricket once again following the previous COVID impacted ones. The 7th season of all-girls cricket on the Northern Beaches was another success with further milestones achieved and the girls continuing to enjoy and develop their cricket. A special thank you from myself and Sam Croll to the girl's cricket coordinators at each of the clubs along with the coaches, managers, scorers and game day helpers for delivering another wonderful season. PlayHQ was a challenge but with a bit of luck it will be smoother sailing next season.

We once again welcomed new players and teams into our competitions across the U11, U13 and U15 age groups along with many girls participating in the Master Blaster format. Since launching all girls cricket in 2016/17 we have seen our numbers grow from just 20 players to now over 270 girls playing in 23 teams across the u11, u13 and u15 competitions and in master blaster. When we add in the four MWDCC senior grade teams, with the majority of the players having come from our u15 club teams, the Manly brand now has over 320 females participating in cricket which is an amazing outcome over a fairly short time period.

The MWJCA female cricket pathway is in place from the entry level Master Blaster programs to the club competitions in the u11, u13 and u15 age groups and the representative teams in the NSW Youth Championship u13 and u15 competitions and excitingly, as of this season, a third representative team in the newly formed u14 girls President's cup competition. When players finish their u15 cricket they can transition into the senior MWDCC Women's grade club and play in the u18 Brewer competition, in total the grade club fields four women's teams in the NSW Women's Premier Cricket competitions.

We continued to play matches at the "girl's hub" grounds at David Thomas, Millers and Passmore which allows the girls and their families to feel part of the cricket community and to fill in for any teams that are short. It and allows the girls to get to know one each more easily and see friends in other teams more often. Playing at the 'hub' has been a great success.

The Pink Stumps Day annual fundraiser for the McGrath Foundation raised over \$2,500 this season taking the total funds raised to almost \$14,000 which is a terrific outcome for a very worthy cause. We look forward to everyone being part of the day once again next season. Special thanks to Sam Croll for leading this initiative and to Darren Kilkeary and to Ashley Jones in particular for a massive effort. Also, a

big thank you to all the prize donators, clubs and parents for their efforts and generosity in making this fun event such a success.

u13 Girls – Harbord Marlins (defeating the CPCC Hurricanes)

u15 Girls – Seaforth Sixers (defeating CPCC Riptide)

Having won their first girls cricket title last season it is fantastic to see Seaforth Cricket Club do the double and win the u15 comp again – well done to all involved in the Seaforth girls cricket program.

The Representative Cricket program once again had a record number of girls register to trial for our female representative teams which shows the strong interest in the cricket opportunities available to our players. As a result, we were able to enter a team into the new u14 girls Presidents Cup competition which was very pleasing as we are keen to support all initiatives to grow girls cricket. We have teams entered into u13, u14 and u15 age groups.

It was another very successful rep season. The u15s progressed to the semi-finals in the NSWYC Peden competition where they played NSJCA and just missed out on the win in a very tight match. A semi-final placing is our best finish to date in this competition, congratulations to all the players and coaches. Our new u14s team were undefeated and won the Grand Final against Parramatta in a fantastic match – a massive well done to all the players and coaches it is a terrific achievement. The NSWYC Mollie Dive u13 team had a great season playing some very competitive cricket and just missed the semis, a win in the final match would have had them finish third on the table, well done on a great season. Attending country cricket carnivals is a special part of the rep cricket program and our u13 girls had another fantastic time at the Kookaburra Cup in Canberra. Unfortunately, due to a schedule change by NSWYC we were unable to send a team to the Orange cricket carnival in January, however we hope to be back next year as it is a carnival the girls and their families really enjoy attending. Congratulations to all the teams and the coaches - David, Shawn, Andrew, Steve and David, team managers and all the other helpers including the selectors. We could offer such great opportunities without your support. Thanks also to all the efforts of the rep committee for all their behind-the-scenes efforts.

Several of our female cricketers have gained further honours with selection into NSW Metro academies and schools' representative teams – well done to all. Six girls from MWJCA have been selected into the CNSW u15 and u16 Academies for the coming season congratulations to Arabella Handley, Lara Hughes, Hannah Moss,

Annabelle Croll, Kaya Punter and Tait Camburn, a fantastic achievement and we wish them every success in these training squads.

Lastly, I will be stepping down as the VP Girls Cricket after a number of years in the role and would like to thank all of those who have shared in the vision of growing girls' cricket over this period. To the executive committee and delegates without your assistance and help this would not have been possible. Sam Croll is taking on the role and having been involved for a number of years, he will do a great job; I wish him every success in guiding girls cricket.

Under 10 and 11 Cricket - Junior Format Stage 1

The Australian Cricket Junior Formats have delivered outstanding results and have proven to provide a far better playing and learning experience for boys and girls early in their cricket journey.

The evidence confirms the players face more balls, can play more shots in more areas, take more wickets and field far more than a traditional 11 a side, full-length pitch formats.

From 2017/18 the MWJCA adopted the Cricket Australia Club Stage 1 Junior Formats for Under 9 and Under 10 cricket. For the 2018/19 season MWJCA aligned to the desired Cricket Australia approach and moved Stage 1 Format cricket to U10 and U11.

Both age groups used the Kookaburra Rookie plastic/rubber cricket ball (or similar) and played on 16m pitches. The boys competitions this season moved to using white balls only and the Girls U11 have, since 2019/20, adopted pink cricket balls.

From the 2021/22 Clubs were encouraged to adopt more colour in their clothing. Some Clubs adopted full coloured clothing, whilst others adopted coloured shirts with the traditional white/cream cricket trousers.

The MWJCA's aim of Club Stage 1 cricket is to enable EVERY player to participate in an enjoyable game. This is no longer an average cricket format of batting in pairs and bowling on rotation. Instead with 7 a side batsman face 17 balls each and everyone gets to bowl. Wickets result in an addition of 4 runs to the bowling team. Player roles are rotated fairly and equally throughout the team to enable them to develop as cricketers and reach their full potential later in their playing life.

There were 62 teams across the Stage 1 boy's competition and 8 girl's teams in 2022/23.

Under 12 and 13 Cricket - Junior Format Stage 2

From 2018/19 the MWJCA moved with Cricket Australia and adopted Stage 2 Junior Format for Under 12 Boys cricket. From the 2019/20 Season Stage 2 Junior Format was also adopted for Under 13 Boys Cricket. For Under 13 Boys this was a move away from the more traditional forms of cricket, and also signalled an end to two-

day Under 13 cricket. The Junior Format Stage 2 was also continued for Under 13 Girls Cricket.

From the 2020/21 season, Under 12 and Under 13 Boys cricket is only one-day matches of 30 overs per side played on an 18m pitch. Teams are 9 a side with batsmen retiring after 35 deliveries. Bowling is shared around. Additionally, MWJCA continued our participation rules for this age group to ensure that as many cricketers get a go as possible.

In a further innovation, the use of a white 142gm leather ball was continued for the Under 13 Boys competition and in 2021/22 also adopted for Under 12 Boys.

Girls Stage 2 Under 13 Cricket is played with the same ball size and team numbers as the boys competition. The main difference being that the girls play T20 cricket only and use a pink 142gm leather ball.

With all formats moving to one-day cricket or shorter, and Youth Championship moving to coloured clothing, from the 2021/22 Clubs were encouraged to adopt more colour in their clothing. Some Clubs adopted full coloured clothing, whilst others adopted coloured shirts with the traditional white/cream cricket trousers.

Under 14 and 15 Division 2 – Junior Format Stage 2

MWJCA also innovated with the Under 14 Division 2 Boys competition from 2021/22 and Under 15 Division 2 Boys Competition from 2022/23, utilising the Stage 2 format of 9 players a side and running T20 matches only. This change has been made to attempt retain Boys in cricket as they move on from Stage 2 cricket. Feedback was that the 9 a side format worked well, however some longer format matches were desired.

Moving forward MWJCA will continue to consider options for Stage 3 age Division 2 competitions in terms of game format and team sizes, with the intention of keeping more boys in cricket. There continues to be a desire within the MWJCA for Division 1 cricket to have the option of longer format or 2-day cricket.

Under 14, 15 and 17 Boys Cricket - Junior Format Stage 3

From 2020/21 the MWJCA moved with Cricket Australia and adopted Stage 3 Junior Format (11 a side) for age group older than Under 13 in the boy's competitions. This signalled an end to two-day for all age groups in the MWJCA with age groups above Under 13 now only playing 30 overs a side cricket.

From 2021/22 all competitions in Stage 3 used white 156gm leather balls. The competitions are played on a full-length pitch.

In adopting the Cricket Australia Stage 3 format MWJCA applied our participation rules. This ensures that the opening batsman are not the opening bowlers, that at

least 8 players of the 11 in the side bowl and that a batsman must retire after facing 50% of the 30 overs available.

In 2022/23, due to the lack of Division 1 teams, the Under 15 and Under 17 Division 1 competitions were combined. The result was a broader competition with variety of opposition. Both Under 15s and Under 17 teams were in the mix at the top of the table across the season.

Moving forward MWJCA will continue to consider options for Stage 3 age Division 2 competitions in terms of game format and team sizes, with the intention of keeping more boys in cricket. There continues to be a desire within the MWJCA for Division 1 cricket to have the option of longer format or 2-day cricket.

Under 15 Girls Cricket - Junior Format Stage 3

Continuing on from previous seasons, the MWJCA adopted the Sixers League Stage 3 Format (11 a side) for the Under 15 Girls Competition. This competition is T20 cricket, is played on a full-length pitch and uses a pink 142gm leather ball.

Representative Chairman's Report 2022/23



It was a relief to enter the start of the 22/23 season free from pandemic restrictions as well as have some decent weather.

It never ceases to amaze me just how much work goes into organising a cricket season behind the scenes. For the rep committee the season preparation starts mid-winter, organising clothing, trials, caps, equipment, grounds, training rosters and carnivals. As with all our club organisers these people are all volunteers who give up a lot of their personal time to ensure the season runs smoothly.

My thanks to David Nimmo, Toby Horstead, Scott Osborne, Anthony Cruickshank, Craig Schneidereit, Carol Boulton, Trish Pavely, Reg McCracken and Andrew Smith for their support and their ability to get things done.

We are also very well supported by Errol Cranney (umpires) and our pathway partnerships with Warringah CC (Chris Melville) and Manly Warringah DCC (David Gainsford, Steve Beatty and Andrew Fraser). The set up we have at Manly is certainly the benchmark for cricket in Sydney.



Both of our senior clubs had outstanding seasons particularly Manly who dominated grade cricket winning the coveted Club Championship, as well as having 4 out of 5 sides playing Grand Finals. From a junior rep perspective, it was fantastic to see so many former MWJCA rep juniors in the ranks.

Before I get into the season, I'd also like to thank all our rep coaches and managers.

While I know they all do it because they love it, it is still a considerable undertaking, and we are very fortunate to have so many high quality coaches coming from a volunteer base.

I have been involved in Manly rep cricket now for 12 years both as a parent, coach and committee member and the continuous improvement both on and off the field has been great to watch and be part of. I have no doubt that this will continue long into the future.

During this time our rep teams have been enormously successful on the field. It is commonplace for Manly to have teams in finals across every age group with a number going on to be Premiers. It has almost become an expectation that we will win and win often and that can sometimes blur reality.

Our mission is to provide a higher level of cricket for our best local junior boys and girls to challenge themselves. Through the course of the six years of junior rep cricket, we want them to improve their skills and become better cricketers, that's a given, but we also want them to build resilience, sportsmanship, teamwork and most importantly we want them to enjoy playing.

Cricket is a great game, but it can be brutal, there aren't many sports that last six hours where your primary involvement can be over in the first five minutes (see resilience).

The best indicator for us as an association is to see how many of our junior players are still playing the game in 10 years time. If you are not enjoying the game, it doesn't matter how good you are, you simply will not stick it out. As adults, be it as parents, coaches or administrators we have a collective duty to remember that they are young, it is a game that the vast majority will never play for a living and the general rule that if you are enjoying what you do you will more than likely do it better.

We love winning and we love playing well, but it will not always be the case and often the best lessons are learnt during the harder times.



This season we were delighted to field a third girls' team for the first time in our history, with an U14 team entering the inaugural Presidents Cup. Not only did they enter the competition, they won it, beating Parramatta in an entertaining final. I was lucky enough to watch the last couple of hours and the excitement, nervousness and enjoyment was palpable! Well done to the girls and all involved in making that a special season for them.



This year turned out to be the semi finals year as most of our teams went down at the penultimate hurdle in often agonisingly close games. It is the worst stage to go out, but lessons would have been learned and with the talent in those teams I am sure they will be back for another crack at the final next season.

Special mention to our U12 boys who did make it through to the Grand Final again going down in a tight finish. Our U13 boys were successful at the Ballina Carnival continuing a long tradition of winners up at the spectacular far north coast.

With team success comes individual recognition and the following players were selected to represent NSW across the different age groups, hopefully one day following in the footsteps of Jack Edwards, Mickey Edwards (Yorkshire CCC) and Ollie and Joel Davies.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all the players for their efforts, their skills and their conduct representing Manly as well as to all the coaches, managers and of course parents for all your support this season.

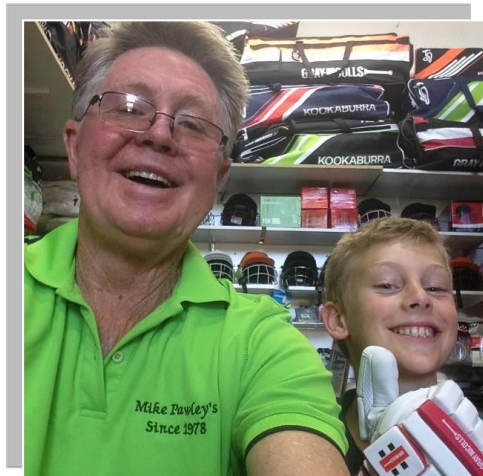

A long season for the boys with the first trial in early September and the final match in mid March. We bowled tightly to start with Will (0/5 off 5) and Archie (1/11 off 5). Dan and Conor then bowled well in tandem with 1 wicket each. Finlay then got 0-8 including 3

consecutive maidens to keep it tight. By now Parramatta had their two best batters at the crease and took the score from 3/22 off 14 overs to 4/86 off 38, when Dylan snared an LBW with his off spin in his 9th over, finishing with 1/24 off 10 straight.
