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



Welcome to the 2020/21 64th Annual Report for the Manly Warringah Junior Cricket Association (MWJCA).

We had a late start to the season, although were able to get in all matches. The MWJCA had a slight increase player numbers again this season across 219 teams, ranging from Master Blast (U8) right through to U17. Girls cricket



continues to grow and this season we had 23 teams, with U11 growing to 10 teams, 2 seasons after this age group was first introduced.

The entry level cricket programs continued to thrive. Junior Blast was played by Beacon Hill, Collaroy Plateau, Cromer, Forest, Harbord, Peninsula and Wakehurst. The final changes were introduced based on Cricket Australia's new Junior Formats in Stage 3 boys.

Kev Davies and **Phill Edwards** were awarded Life Membership of the MWJCA for their significant contributions to the association. Both men created and ran the Mini Bash until this season. Kev was on the rep committee for many years, coached junior rep teams and was the Harbord delegate for the MWJCA committee for a long time. Criteria for Association Awards 2020/21

BATTING – to qualify for batting average awards, a batsman must bat in 6 innings and score 100 runs or more during the season.

BOWLING – to qualify for bowling average awards, a bowler must take 15 wickets* and bowl 30 overs during the season

* Where 15 wickets have not been taken by any bowlers in a competition, the bowling average award will be based on bowling 30 overs and the highest number of wickets taken.

Junior Blasters

Junior Blasters is the entry-level cricket program, formerly known as In2CRICKET. Junior Blasters is designed for boys and girls from **5 to 8 years old** and gives participants a chance to take part in a variety of activities to develop cricket, physical




fitness and social skills, sportsmanship and an understanding of the game of cricket. The emphasis is on fun and maximising participation.

The following clubs established a Junior Blasters program this season: **Beacon Hill**, **Collaroy Plateau**, **Forest**, **Harbord**, **Peninsula**, **Seaforth** and **Wakehurst**.

Master Blasters - Under 9 Cricket

cricket using lighter equipment in a format that is fast paced with equal participation. The program was developed to ensure junior cricketers can progress with confidence to Stage 1 of Junior Formats.

In line with Cricket Australia, Saturday Master Blasters was this year extended to boys and girls **under 9 years** of age with games played at a number of venues across the Northern Beaches within our existing club structure.

The MWJCA had the following Master Blasters centres on Saturday mornings:

- Jackson Road, Warriewood
 - Participating Club was Peninsula with 6 Teams
- Lionel Watts, Frenchs Forest
 - Participating Clubs were Forest and Wakehurst with 18 Teams
- Beacon Hill Oval, Beacon Hill
 - Participating Clubs were Beacon Hill, Collaroy Plateau with 12 Teams
- Adams St Reserve, Curl Curl
 - Participating Club was Harbord with 6 Teams
- Seaforth Oval, Seaforth
 - Participating Club was Seaforth with 16 Teams



Manly Mini Bash 08 - 2021

In February 2014 MWJCA introduced a T20 competition called "Manly Mini Bash" so that that young players could get an understanding of T20 at a young age to become better, well-rounded players and great T20 players of the future. The tournament was successful and received a lot of very positive feedback from both players and parents. In light of that, the tournament has continued to run and is now in its seventh year.



Some of the driving principles underpinning Manly Mini Bash are that participation comes ahead of winning, and that you play for enjoyment - winning is a bonus. Scores are not entered into MyCricket, so players tend to play in a more carefree manner purely for the fun of the game. Bonus points are awarded for achieving certain milestones. These are important factors that make it so enjoyable for both players and parents.

Some major changes were made to the 2021 Manly Mini Bash 08:

Phill Edwards & Kevin Davies handed over to Fiona Brewster (St Aug's) & Simon Martin along with some help from Louise MacFarlane (both HDJCC).

Once again it was run as a separate tournament and scores and results were not entered into MyCricket. As it was wholly standalone from the Saturday morning competition:

- Match results had no impact on the Saturday morning league tables.
- Player scores had no impact on individual player awards at the end of the season.
- Match results and scores had no bearing on club championship points.

Consideration was again given to a girl's Manly Mini Bash tournament, but was decided against this as girls already play T20 in the MWJCA weekend comp. Once again, this year boy's teams were strongly encouraged to invite girls to play in their team, with girls allowed to play up to 2 years below their age group. Unfortunately, there was little evidence again of this being implemented by teams.

Structure

As usual, boy's teams from U11 Division 1 and above were invited to participate. Simon Martin from Harbord Devils Cricket Club managed the recruitment campaign this year. MMB 08 was comprised of 8 leagues and because of the numbers of



teams and the reduced ability to mix age groups (due to pitch lengths varying by age) we had to compromise on team numbers per league. The ideal number is 4 but we had the following:

Out of this season's 165 eligible teams 34 played MMB – a participation rate of only 20%. All teams that wanted to play were accommodated, including a couple late entries. It's clear that the MMB participation rate continues to trend downwards.

Once again, MWJCA provided bright orange and pink balls which not only help to differentiate from other cricket, but also have a very practical impact on visibility which is an important safety consideration with matches completing at 7:15pm.

Leagues with four teams were scheduled to play each other once in pool rounds. Knockout semi-finals are then played (1 vs 4 and 2 vs 3) for places in the finals. The bonus system of points for certain playing milestones continued from previous years.

Leagues with five teams should play four pool rounds with no semi-finals — after four rounds the top two teams play the final.

This year only the semi-finals for the U11 - 13's were washed out.

Finals

Semi-finals and finals are decided purely on runs scored with bonus points playing no part. With the kind cooperation of the Manly Touch Football Association we were able to play all finals at Nolans Reserve again this year. This is something we hope to do every year in order to create a carnival atmosphere. We were able to run the Fund Raising BBQ on both nights and James Maxwell was able to get the sausages donated by Harris Farm & he donated the rolls – thanks James! Louise MacFarlane helped organise the BBQ set up & assisted with running it. Thanks to Scott and Will Brewster and late ring in, David Nimmo for also assisting with the Thursday BBQ!

The support of independent umpires for the finals was very much appreciated.



Thanks go to Mike Pawley Sports for yet again providing generous prizes for finals including cricket bats. Also, a big thanks to Andrew Dawes of the Butchers' Café on Sydney road for donating vouchers & caps.

Most Valuable Player (MVP) awards

2020/21 Manly-Warringah Female Cricket

Summary

The 2020/21 season was the 5th season for all-





girls cricket on the Northern Beaches and we are pleased to report it was another successful season despite the difficulties thrown up by COVID. Thank you to everyone involved for another wonderful season especially the girl's coordinators at each of the clubs for their efforts along with the coaches, managers and scorers.

We once again welcomed new players and teams into our competitions across the U11, U13 and U15 age groups along with a record number of girls participating in the Master Blasters format.

We also welcome and thank Sam Croll who came on board at the association level to administer girls cricket his help and insight was greatly appreciated.

Since launching all girls in 2016/17 and we have seen our numbers grow from 20 to now over **220 girls playing in 23 teams** across the U11, U13 and U15 competitions. When we combine all girls from Master Blasters, MWJCA club competitions and MWDCC senior grade teams (the majority of which have progressed from our club teams) 'Manly' now has over 300 females participating in cricket which is amazing.

The MWJCA female cricket pathway is in place from the entry level Master Blasters programs to club competitions (U11, U13 and U15) to representative teams in the U13 and U15 age groups. From there players then transition into the MWDCC grade club where three teams are currently entered into the NSW Women's Premier Cricket competitions.

We continued play matches at the popular "girl's hub" grounds at David Thomas, Millers and Passmore and again invested in shade tents for these afternoon matches



along with scorer's tables. The Hub has allowed the girls and their families to feel part of the cricket community and enabled the girls to get to know other girls more easily and see friends in other teams more often.



Once again, we held our annual fundraiser for the McGrath Foundations Pink Stumps Day which was expanded to include new initiatives this year. **The day raised \$2,800 which was our best result to date** and takes our total funds raised since we began to over \$7,500. Well done to Sam Croll for leading this initiative and to Darren Kilkeary and to Ashley Jones in particular, for a massive effort. A big thank you also goes to all the prize donators, clubs and parents for their efforts and generosity in making this fun event such a success.

MWJCA Representative Competitions

This year both the MWJCA girl's representative teams made the semi-finals which is a terrific achievement, even better the Under 13s finished joint premiers, a first-time achievement for our rep girls' teams, following rain affecting both their semi and grand final. The Under 15s were beaten in a close semi by a strong ACT team who went on to win the grand final. A big congratulations to both teams' players, coaches, managers and scorers. Also well done to our female cricketers who have gained further honours following selection into NSW State Challenge teams, NSW Metro academies and school representative teams.

A record number of girls have registered to trial for our U13 and U15 representative teams for the coming season which shows the strength and growing interest in girl's cricket – we wish them all the best in their trials.

Manly-Warringah Under 11 Sixers Girls Cricket Competition

This was the third season for our Under 11 girl's competition and again the girls had a great time and developed their cricket skills. The format is designed to keep girls in the game after they graduate from the junior and master blaster programs. Ten teams played this year up from 9 last year with 7 of our 8 clubs entering at least one team.



The competition is a 7-a-side T20 format (stage 1) played with a

modified ball. The batter's bat for their allotted 17 balls (no actual outs for this age group). The games were played midmorning Saturday at the 'hub' and completed in 2 hours.

Congratulation to **Harbord Dolphins** who ended the season on top of the table.







Manly-Warringah Under 13 Sixers Girls Cricket Competition

The Under 13 girl's competition is where girl's cricket began 5 years ago, and it continues to be a huge success. The competition is run under the Sixers Girls Cricket League rules. We had seven teams entered the competition this year.

The competition is a 9-a-side T20 format played with a hard ball (when you're out, you're out), with retirement after 18 balls. The games were played on a Saturday afternoon at the 'hub' taking 2.5 hours to complete.

Many congratulations to the Wakehurst Opals who were successful in the final.

Manly-Warringah Under 15 Sixers Girls Cricket Competition

The Under 15 girl's competition had six teams enter, up from last year's 4 which was fantastic to see as it shows teams are transitioning through the competition.

The U15 competition is a 9-a-side T20 format played with a leather cricket ball with retirement after 30 balls faced. Games were played on Saturday afternoon at the 'hub'.



Congratulations to the **Wakehurst Redbacks** for both topping the table and winning the grand final - a great achievement. With a number of the Wakehurst girls now becoming Under 16 and having played many seasons in the all-girls competition they will be looking to move into MWDCC women premier cricket teams - we wish them all the best and thank them for being some of the pioneers of MWJCA's all girl's cricket.

Under 10 and 11 Cricket - Junior Format Stage 1

The Australian Cricket Junior Formats have delivered outstanding results and have proven to provide a far better playing and learning experience for boys and girls early in their cricket journey.

The evidence confirms the players face more balls, can play more shots in more areas, take more wickets and field far more than a traditional 11 a side, full-length pitch formats.

From 2017/18 the MWJCA adopted the Cricket Australia Club Stage 1 Junior Formats for Under 9 and Under 10 cricket. For the 2018/19 season MWJCA aligned to the desired Cricket Australia approach and moved Stage 1 Format cricket to U10 and U11. Both age groups used the Kookaburra Rookie plastic/rubber cricket ball (or similar) and played on 16m pitches. Girls U11 have, since 2019/20, adopted pink cricket balls.

The MWJCA's aim of Club Stage 1 cricket is to enable EVERY player to participate in an enjoyable game. This is no longer an average cricket format of batting in pairs and bowling on rotation. Instead with 7 a side batsman face 17 balls each and everyone gets to bowl. Wickets result in an addition of 4 runs to the bowing team. Player roles are rotated fairly and equally throughout the team to enable them to develop as cricketers and reach their full potential later in their playing life.

There were 62 teams across the Stage 1 boy's competition and 10 girl's teams in 2020/21.

Under 12 and 13 Cricket - Junior Format Stage 2

From 2018/19 the MWJCA moved with Cricket Australia and adopted Stage 2 Junior Format for Under 12 Boys cricket. From the 2019/20 Season Stage 2 Junior Format was also adopted for Under 13 Boys Cricket. For Under 13 Boys this was a move away from the more traditional forms of cricket, and also signalled an end to two-day Under 13 cricket. The Junior Format Stage 2 was also continued for Under 13 Girls Cricket.

From the 2020/21 season, Under 12 and Under 13 Boys cricket is only one-day matches of 30 overs per side played on an 18m pitch. Teams are 9 a side with batsmen retiring after 35 deliveries. Bowling is shared around. Additionally, MWJCA



continued our participation rules for this age group to ensure that as many cricketers get a go as possible.

In a further innovation, the use of a white 142gm leather ball was continued for the Under 13 Boys competition. With all formats moving to one-day cricket or shorter, and Youth Championship moving to coloured clothing, it is anticipated that MWJCA will also move to coloured clothing and coloured balls in the coming seasons.

Girls Stage 2 Under 13 Cricket is played with the same ball size and team numbers as the boys competition. The main difference being that the girls play T20 cricket only and use a pink 142gm leather ball.

Under 14, 15 and 16 Boys Cricket - Junior Format Stage 3

From 2020/21 the MWJCA moved with Cricket Australia and adopted Stage 3 Junior Format (11 a side) for age group older than Under 13 in the boy's competitions. This signalled an end to two-day for all age groups in the MWJCA with age groups above Under 13 now only playing 30 overs a side cricket. Following on from U13 last season the Under 14 boys competition used white 156gm leather balls. The competitions are played on a full-length pitch.

In adopting the Cricket Australia Stage 3 format MWJCA applied our participation rules. This ensures that the opening batsman are not the opening bowlers, that at least 8 players of the 11 in the side bowl and that a batsman must retire after facing 50% of the 30 overs available.

Moving forward MWJCA will consider options for Division 2 competitions in terms of game format and team sizes, with the intention of keeping more boys in cricket. There continues to be a desire within the MWJCA for Division 1 cricket to have the option of longer format or 2-day cricket.

Under 15 Girls Cricket - Junior Format Stage 3

Continuing on from previous seasons, the MWJCA adopted the Sixers League Stage 3 Format (11 a side) for the Under 15 Girls Competition. This competition is T20 cricket, is played on a full-length pitch and uses a pink 142gm leather ball.

twice in the past. We had 8 representative debutants and only five players still eligible to play from the 2019/20 season. Despite their youth and inexperience with rep cricket for many of the girls, to remain undefeated and go on to be joint premiers was an amazing achievement. While disappointing that both the semi final and grand final were washed out, the girls did Manly very proud throughout the season. Also, congratulations to Parramatta on their joint premiership and who we would have met in the grand final – also undefeated during the season.

It has once again been an honour to coach Mollie Dive in its 5th season and wonderful to see first-hand this great group of girls and blossom in their confidence, enjoyment, camaraderie and cricket ability as the season progressed. Each one of the girls should be extremely proud of their achievements and all were a credit to Manly.

Due to COVID, our March trials were cancelled so we assembled all the players in late July and did a trial from which we selected 18 players to be part of the Mollie Dive Academy program where the girls trained together in August and September working on various skills of the game. Each of the girls showed an amazing attitude, highlighted by a strong willingness to learn, and take on board everything they were told. Having selected our final team of prior to the school holidays, we continued to focus on a few key goals that held us in good stead for the season and saw the girls go from strength to strength:

- Enjoy the game, make friendships and have a fun time!
- Be able to score runs through singles and be good at calling and running between wickets.
- Be able to bowl at targets.
- Be the best fielding team we can be.





After selection of the Mollie Dive team and learning that the season wasn't to commence until January, we continued to train on Sunday mornings, where we really focused on our goals and set a solid platform for the season to come. With such a young team and plenty of debutants, I was hopeful of getting a few wins under our belt, but set no expectations with the girls. We focused on enjoyment and improving our skills as a team, so to achieve what we did was an amazing result for Manly girl's cricket and testament to the players, officials and the wonderful support of all the families. The girls have done themselves, their families and Manly proud for the entire season and gave us many exciting and memorable moments!

In retrospect, with the semi final vs Sutherland/St George washed out, our narrow defeat of them in Round 4 really decided our season in the end as we went straight through to the grand final. It was a magnificent game with two undefeated teams very keen for a win. We scored 73 in our 20 overs with Daisy Addison and Sophia Slater putting on 41 for the 4th wicket after we were reeling at 3/8. While we felt it may not be enough at the time, we had underestimated the sheer quality of our bowling and fielding attack. With Sutherland/St. George looking good on 0/34 after 8 overs, our Manly girls set about a demolition led by Jazzy James and Darcey Whiteley who in 8 overs of partnership bowling took 5/19 and put Manly back with a genuine chance of a win. Sutherland continued to fight bravely and needing 12 runs off the last 2 overs with 4 wickets in hand we had a nail biter on our hands. Sophia bowled beautifully in the 19th over only conceding 2 runs – Sutherland requiring 10 to win in the final over. Arabella Handley comes on and first ball is a yorker into the stumps. 10 runs required off 5 deliveries. Those 5 balls went like this – dot-dot-1-2-1 – what turned out to be a crucial win for Manly that ultimately determined our premiership!

Thanks to Dom Wheeler and Danny LeMoy who provided tremendous support as the

assistant coaches this season. Danny and I have worked together coaching junior reps for about 10 or more seasons now and always a pleasure. In our pre-season bowling clinic where we got all the players to attempt spin bowling, it became evident that Hughesy who had trialled as a pace bowler was a natural right arm off-spin bowler. As we worked with Lara (also affectionately know as "Brian") in the pre-season she improved out of sight being able to show great control, flight and movement off the pitch. Taking 4 wickets @ 8.75, Lara proved very difficult for the opposition batters and figures of 2/2 in Round 1 validated her conversion to spin bowling. Hughesy is an incredibly hard hitter of a cricket ball and anything loose is



punished. This season she worked very hard at training to develop a straighter bat to better play the full-length deliveries and she has progressed well. Player Profiles

Emily Horstead (Co-Captain)

Emily was appointed as one of the co-captains and took control on the field steering the team to third on the ladder after the rounds and then only 6 runs short in a very exciting semi-final against the eventual competition winners ACT. Tactically Emily excelled, especially in the big moments and demonstrated knowledge and skills well beyond her years. In addition to her captaincy Emily is a talented allrounder and didn't disappoint with a successful season. She finished with 126 runs @ 21 and 8 wickets at 14.38. Em's highest was against ACT in round 2 when she put together a solid 40,

which set the tone for the season after a batting collapse in round 1. But there were a couple of other key innings that stood out including ensuring the team collected the bonus points against Penrith where Em opened and batted throughout the innings until we reached the winning runs remaining 25 not out. She then followed this up with a very dominate 27 in the Semi-final. With the ball Em consistently featured, returning 8 wickets at 14 including figures of 3/18, 2/4 and 1/11. Add to all this her 4 catches. Well done Emily on your game management skills plus a solid season with both bat and ball.



Eliza Henry (Co-Captain)

Eliza, as co-captain led from the front in her on field performances. Eliza was an integral part of our season success and personally should be very proud of her achievements. Not only was Eliza the Champion Payer in the Peden competition for



the season, she was the leading run scorer with 207 @ an average of 29.57 after the rounds and semi-final weekend. She also dominated with the ball, as our leading wicket taker Eliza finished with 11 wickets @ 11. After a guiet start, Eliza impressed all at the ground with a quality 68 against Inner West Harbour / South Eastern, dispatching the ball to all areas. Her innings that day included two match defining partnerships of 54 (with Em) and 48 (with Sophie). In that same game, and with Maya's absence, Eliza took up the challenge of bowling spin, and after consecutive 8 overs the team had locked in a second spinner. Off the back of this game, Eliza raised the bar against Greater Illawarra to produce a performance that she should remember for a lifetime. With the bat Eliza scored 94 off 95 balls, her personal best score, then to back this up, took 5/18 of 7.2 overs. To add to the 5 wickets, she also took 3 catches that day! Whilst her 94 is only a few runs short of a century, and the all-time best MWJCA Peden score, she can now claim the best bowling figures of all time for a MWJCA player in Peden. Well done Eliza on a very strong season; it was a joy to watch you bat, especially the pull shot in action, plus awesome to see you roll out the off spin. Congratulations all round.

Olivia Champion

One of our opening bowlers Olivia quickly built a reputation as a wicket taker with her stump to stump bowling. In our very first trial Oliva took 4/6 and then backed this up with 3/7 and once the opposition went back into bat again beyond the 10 wickets Oliva finished with figures of 7/18. With the trials and 10 wickets behind her, Olivia still maintained her accuracy and ability to take wickets within the competition. As an opening bowler she always had the opposition in defence mode, with the batters holding out balls that often would be hitting the stumps. In Round 4, the second of our T20 games, Olivia returned her best ever 'official' figures of 3/15 including dismissing





the Central Coast batter with the very first ball of the game. Three games later against Penrith Oliva again retuned the same figures of 3/15, this time off 7.1 overs. A quality bowler, Olivia puts most oppositions on the back foot from the outset with her consistent line and length and is a huge asset to any cricket team. Congratulations Oliva on a wonderful first year of rep cricket; you should be really pleased with your results and looking forward to continued success next season.

Sophia Chick

Over the years Sophia always had the ability to bowl the very best wicket taking delivery, often leaving the opposition batters confused with the amount of outswing she can generate. Pleasingly this season Sophia added significant amounts of consistency to her game and was one of our go to bowlers in the last few rounds knowing that she would bowl the same bowl over and over again with very few sundries. Whilst not collecting wickets Sophia returned the figures of 0/5 off 3 against Inner West/South Eastern and then in her next spell took 0/3 off 4, effectively returning figures of 8 runs over 7 overs which is unheard of in limited overs cricket. Backing all this up, Sophia had the best bowling economy from the quicks in the team. Whilst given limited opportunity with the bat, Sophia did not disappoint when an opportunity presented; her highlight was her 39-run partnership, in the last 5 overs, which in many ways defined the result in the second of our T20 games. In the field Sophia set the standard, always backing up and involving herself no matter where the ball was. Her movement and support to the others on the field did not go unnoticed. She collected two back to back catches in the cover position finishing our game against Greater Illawarra. Sophia should be really pleased with her progress, and most importantly build on her improved consistency to become one of our leading bowlers in seasons to come. Well done Sophia on a great season.

Caitlin du Preez

With success in all of our three trials Caitlin was earmarked for a big season, and as a leading allrounder was expected to feature in both batting and bowling. Unfortunately, after missing out early on with the bat it was pleasing to see Caitlin finish strongly with the bat after being elevated to the opening position in round 6. With this position change Caitlin became one of the in-form batters, achieving an average of 32 when opening the batting. In that round 6 game Caitlin produced her best innings ever, dispatching the ball to all areas of Grahams along the way to securing her very first fifty. Beyond her own scores, in Caitlin's 3 innings in the opening position, she was involved in significant partnerships in all games including 128 (with Eliza), 49 and 39 (both with Emily). With the ball Caitlin's best and one of the memorable moments of the season was her 3/20 against Inner West Harbour / South Eastern where after collecting two wickets in two consecutive balls, came millimetres away from collecting a hat-trick. Caitlin was strategically placed to field at mid-on (next to the bowlers) for the season; Caitlin's continued presence alongside our youthful fast

Brooke Frew

During her first season of rep cricket Brooke proved to be a real asset to the team, often providing more than very handy contributions to the score batting in the number 4 or 5 position. In Brooke's seven innings she managed to get into double figures five times, including two not outs and in most cases, if not all her strike rate was right up there. In her last two innings Brooke was looking good, playing in a very confident manner; against Penrith she was 18 not out off only 21 balls and then in the semi-final was 17 off 24 balls before being unfortunately dismissed off an amazing direct hit run out. Whilst Brooke didn't manage a big score, she clearly showed capability and consistency. 

Our season was typified by the team effort that saw different players standing up when it mattered which set the foundation for success. The boys always conducted themselves well on the field and off, doing Manly proud.

There were 3 debutantes to the rep scene, but all the boys came together and started to bond from the outset and built a strong team culture. As a result, by the time the final came around, we were a cohesive unit that was aware of each other's strengths and weaknesses, proving a formidable force for any opposition.

It was not all plain sailing, as we were faced with a number of obstacles - from washouts, heatwaves and underwater pitches to a 2-month delay for the GF due to the COVID lock-down. Despite that we made sure the boys not only developed their game but enjoyed the whole experience.

In the regular season, a first up win to North Shore at home was closely followed by an early loss to Sutherland, in our first away game in very wet conditions, which provided a valuable lesson in reading and playing the conditions. From that point onwards the boys went undefeated for the rest of the season and finals, culminating in the Grand Final win in late February.

The final was played against North Shore, whom we knew well as we played a number of trial games and a regular season game, and it was fitting we got to play a Grand



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Final against a quality opposition that would test us. Tom O'Brien flew down for the game, and that level of commitment was recognised by all (including our opposition) and James Pallant also bravely fielded in the final with a splint, courtesy of the broken hand he picked up at Rugby trials the weekend prior. Some of the boys had not played a rep final before, so it was met with equal parts excitement and nerves.

On Grand Final day, the boys did well in the field and with ball in hand, but we were in a precarious position early in the chase. We were able to draw on our strengths and rally together to overhaul the target and win the NSW Youth Championships Div 2 competition, bring home the WG Foster shield for Manly-Warringah.

The boys have all become better cricketers over the season, improving their skills in reading the game, batting and bowling to targets, scoring runs through singles, running hard to turn the singles into twos, and developing a team-first mentality. The boys now have valuable finals experience to draw upon in future years if they work hard to get back into a similar position.

Although we only really focused on team targets, it's important at the end of a season to reflect and acknowledge a few noteworthy individual performances over the year.

A few highlights were:

Rory Toole - maiden rep half-century (95* off 53 balls) v St George and 5/15 in the Semi-Final v IWH

Dylan Thompson – A half-century against Hornsby (51*) and top score in the Grand Final with 48*

Thomas Walker – maiden rep half-century (50) v St George as well as 4/9 with the ball vs Hornsby

Will Cunningham – took a wicket in every match, best bowling figures for Manly in the Grand Final

Henry Matthews – 2nd highest number of catches (6) in the competition

These are the main highlights, but the numbers don't tell the whole story and every player made their impact felt and contributed to our victories with bat, ball or in the field over the season.

Three players (Aidan Kurtis, Cameron Russell and Rory Toole) wore the baggy blue for the first time. Freddie Schneidereit also came into the team from the shadow squad in round 4, and was on the winning team in every match he played in. We thank Joe Stoddart for his efforts in the 2 games he played with us, as well as the rest of the shadow squad (Mitchell Ballard and Jack Lind) for their efforts and enthusiasm at training and in our pre-season trial games.



We had a supportive group of parents, siblings and family who helped things run smoothly on match day and assist at training whenever called upon which helped me to focus on coaching the boys.

A big thanks to our team manager Steve Matthews for keeping us organised and on top of our COVID requirements, as well as sorting umpires, balls, entering team sheets... just to name a few. Thanks also to Phil Russell for scoring, Jason Cook for setting up the grounds, Kate Walker for the supply of refreshments, Nick Kurtis and Dan Cunningham for their regular help at training as well as Marcus Cooper and others for their help on gameday.

I also thank Benji Cook, who served as mentor to the boys and assistant coach to me on most game days or at training and was there with a supportive word and an arm around the boys when they may have missed out. A real student of the game, Benji was a great support and on behalf of the team we thank you for giving up your time to help.

In summary, the boys always gave 100% effort...which is all you can ask of them, and the focus on the performance meant the results took care of themselves.

It was a privilege to be entrusted as Coach of this Manly rep side and I am looking forward to witnessing the boys develop their cricket and represent Manly with pride over the next few years.

The Players

Player of the Season

Rory Toole

230 runs @ 38.33 including a top score of 95* (53) vs St George, 44 (57) and 5/15 from 5.5 overs in the semi Final, with 31 (46) and 1/5 from 4 overs in the Grand Final.

Henry Matthews (Captain)

Henry took on the captaincy role this season, a tough task given the many fielding restriction rules he had to deal with, but he led the team to a championship title and is a capable leader.

Henry always used his performance in the field to set the example for the team and he finished with the 2nd highest number of catches (6) for the NSWYC U12 competition. A quick learner and good listener, the visit from ex-Aussie skipper Ian Chappell to our training to help out with the close fielding skills certainly paid off for him.

He was also more than capable with bat and ball, scoring 65 runs at an average of 21.67 and claiming 10 wickets at an average of 9.9. His best game came against St



George where he scored 29 (19) and picked up 3-14 from 7 overs. His 24* (23) vs Hornsby was also instrumental in getting that win.

Archie Cooper (Vice-Captain)

Archie is a quiet achiever and opened the batting during the season, scoring 72 runs at an average of 9.00, including a top score of 37 against St George. Opening the batting is not always easy, yet Archie always took on the challenge for the team - using his positive intent to get us off to some good starts, especially in the T20's.

He is also very handy with ball in hand and often was entrusted with the job of breaking the tempo and taking a wicket when we needed it. He took 5 wickets at an average of 7.40, including a best of 2/7 vs Hornsby. Archie always performed well in the field, with a good work ethics and safe pair of hands at slip. He was on hand to assist when called upon with vice captaincy duties.



Rory Toole

Rory made his rep debut this year and delivered some top performances with bat and ball. A genuine all-rounder, his tally of 230 runs placed him 4th in the overall NSWYC aggregates, with an average of 38.33. His 10 wickets were also taken at an average of 6.0.

Rory's highlights came as early as round 5, with a 95* off 53 balls against St. George, but he got even better as the season went on and the opposition got tougher, culminating in a 5/15 performance with the ball in the Semi Final and a wicket and a valuable 31 runs in the Grand Final, which earned him the Player of the Grand Final accolade.

Rory's naturally aggressive style was evident from the outset, using his size and strength to plunder boundaries, but it was great to see Rory also play with patience and build some big scores at vital times. He took one catch over the season, but he has a great throw and is an asset in the field.



Aidan Kurtis

Another debutante for Manly this year, Aidan made a smooth transition to the team. He's regularly first to training, with unparalleled talk and energy levels on and off the field. He is a dedicated batsman so didn't bowl across the season, but he scored 79 runs at an average of 11.29, and his biggest achievement was a team high 46 in the Semi Final vs Inner West Harbour to set up that game, a great knock under pressure.

He cares about his contribution to the team, so if he misses out, he is naturally disappointed but has shown maturity to put that behind him and rally for the team cause. His hard work at training in the field has paid off, culminating in a great one-handed catch against North Shore in the Grand Final that shifted momentum back to us at an important time. I'm sure Aidan will fondly remember winning a championship in his first rep season.

Tom O'Brien

Tom played a key number 3 role this season scoring 140 runs at an average of 17.5 including a top score of 38 vs St George, and a match-winning 37 in our first game of the season vs North Shore punctuated by fantastic running between the wickets.

As one of the smallest members of the team, Tom was regularly underestimated by the opposition who were unaware he has a great pair of hands – he claimed 4 catches during the year at important stages of our games and his ground fielding also steadily improved throughout the year.

It is with mixed emotions that we report that Tom has moved to Northern NSW and





won't be in Manly colours next season. We wish you all the best Tom, you've a bright future ahead.

Claude Gatehouse

Claude is one of our more athletic players and used his talent to good effect, serving as a catalyst to our running between the wickets to dig us out of a hole in the middle order on a few occasions. In the shortened T20 format this really came to the fore, as he hit a match-winning top score of 33 (30) against Parramatta.

Overall, Claude scored 83 runs at an average of 11.86, but with the bowling attack we possessed his opportunities with the ball were limited. To his credit, he put the effort in the field and took 4 catches during the season and it shows how much his fielding improved over the year.

Claude also worked very hard on his play off the pads and made noticeable improvement as the season went on, opening up more scoring zones that should see him convert those good starts into big scores in the future.

Dylan Thompson

Dylan took on shared wicket-keeping duties this year, and to finish equal 2nd in the NSWYC comp for stumpings is something to be proud of for a novice rep wicket-keeper. He improved his keeping as the season went on - claiming 2 stumpings, a runout and a catch behind the stumps in our last regular season game in 39 degree heat, and backing up in the Semi Final to take a catch, run out and a stumping. He also contributed with a couple of key catches in the outfield.

Dylan often opened the batting, taking on the anchoring role which suited the longer-format games, scoring 119 runs at an average of 19.83. Early on Dylan posted a valuable half century (51) to see us just get home against Hornsby, but his best performance with the bat was kept until the very last game with a top score of 48* not out in the Grand Final against North Shore.

The work on his fitness to improve his running between the wickets paid off in spades, as it was hard running rather than boundaries that scored the runs we needed. With the team in early trouble at 4/12 we needed someone to dig in under the pressure of a Grand Final to build the innings and see us home, which was acknowledged by both umpires at the end of the game.

James Pallant

James was an important cog in the team, sharing wicket-keeping duties. He finished equal 2nd in the NSWYC comp for stumpings, a great achievement and reward for his hard work. His catch, run out and 2 stumpings in the game against St. George in the heat showed his mental and physical ability behind the stumps.



With the bat, James had limited opportunities as often the top and middle order were able to overhaul the totals, but he scored 33 runs at an average of 16.5. His 8* against Canterbury, when we had to score quick runs to get a result, was a highlight.

James is a courageous kid, putting his body on the line regularly. This was most evident in the Grand Final, when he stopped balls going past him (with his hand in splint!) a week after breaking his hand. He's also a capable let-arm bowler and it's unfortunate James couldn't bowl more, but he did his job with the gloves instead and without complaint, which helped the team immensely. That sums him up... a team man, and one of the most insightful when the boys were tasked with assessing game situations. His game awareness combined with his positive attitude will serve him well in the future.

Thomas Walker

Thomas always gives his all for the team cause and looks for ways to continually improve himself. With the bat he scored 98 runs at an average of 16.33, hitting with power but he has also improved his ground hitting and running. He used both in the Grand Final vs North Shore, hitting a quick fire 20 to contribute to an ultimately match winning team total. His 50 against St George, a maiden rep half-century, was a delight to watch as he played with little risk and scored with shots that he was convinced the week before were beyond him, but worked hard to resolve.

His bowling is defined by his consistency, bowling the right line and length and really testing opposition batsmen enabling him to take 8 wickets at an average of 7.5 across his 8 games, and earning him a call-up to the Div 1 team for 2 games. His best haul came against Hornby, where we were missing our opening bowler, and he stood up to the task and took 4/9 off his 8 overs. Thomas can be an intimidating force on game day when he's hunting wickets... or even in the nets!

In the field, he is comfortable taking on the deeper fielding positions around the boundary or stationed in close to take the catches or stop the single. He took 5 catches and 3 run-outs across the season, showing great commitment and that he has an arm to be respected.

Jayden Cook

An asset to our team, Jayden was missed when he was called up to play a couple of games in Div 1, as he often delivered with bat or ball. His fielding was also excellent, claiming 5 run-outs and 3 catches in the field, making the hard catches look easy.

Whether bowling at the start or at the death, he built pressure on opposition batters – bowling maidens with regularity. Jayden possibly wasn't rewarded with the individual wickets he deserved but took 4 wickets at an average of 18 across his 7 games. His best performance came in heatwave conditions against Canterbury, needing a quick result Jayden took 1/2 from his 3 overs, in an opening bowling partnership yielding 4/6 from 6 overs, as we bowled them out for 29 in record time.



Jayden is a all-rounder that regularly contributed valuable runs down the order... and quickly... adding 103 runs at an average of 34.33 – with a team-high strike rate of 107. In the Grand Final, he was there at the crease to see us home which speaks to his ability to cope with pressure. He puts the team first and goes for it, and can close out an innings.

Will Cunningham

An absolute model of consistency, Will made the player of the season award a difficult choice.

Despite limited opportunities with the bat, Will did exactly what he was asked to do each time – bat out the overs or score quickly, scoring 7 runs (@ an average of 7). He hit the winning runs in our first game vs North Shore and saw out the overs in the Semi-Final vs Inner West Harbour.

His biggest contribution was as our regular opening bowler, where Will returned 14 wickets at an average of 10.43, earning him 4th place in the NSWYC competition - a fair reflection for his efforts. With the ball, he bowled the tough overs at the start and end of the innings and did so with great consistency (likened to a 'metronome'). In every game Will took at least 1 wicket but he also got better as the year went on. His last 3 games saw him return with figures of 2/0, 3/18 in the Semi Final, and 2/15 in the Grand Final.

He is a team player with a great attitude and an enthusiastic fielder that's keen to improve – regularly throwing down the stumps at training – which will serve him well in future years.

Cameron Russell

As a debutante, the learning curve for Cameron was a little steeper than for some of the other boys but he managed to adapt well. Overall Cam took 3 wickets at an average of 29 with his left arm pace.

His most dangerous spells often went unrewarded, but he has showed the talent he has. A good left-arm bowler is a valuable commodity and his spells often yielded wickets at the other end, which proves the value of bowling in partnerships.





When Cameron relaxed, he was a different bowler, showing consistent line and length and the ability to control the early swing, which posed a real threat to the batsmen.

With the bat he had limited chances, but did exactly what was asked of him scoring 8 runs at an average of 8. He also contributed 2 catches and a run out during the year which highlights the improvements he has made with his fielding... he seems to be enjoying it which will hold in good stead in future.

Freddie Schneidereit

Freddie came into the team from Round 4 and took the chance with both hands - proving to be our good luck charm, as we never lost a game with Freddie on the team sheet. His commitment is unwavering, often travelling back from family holidays a few hours away to participate in a trial, training or a match, and proof that commitment and having the right attitude takes you a long way.

Despite not batting much in games, he trained hard and was the inaugural winner of the team's running between the wickets challenge at training. His only chance with the bat came during a game when tasked with scoring quickly and he fell victim putting the team first.

With the ball, Freddie went unrewarded in his first game, but he took at least 1 wicket in every game after that. His total of 8 wickets at an average of 7.88 were a great return from the games played. The biggest development in Freddie's game has been his ability to flight the ball and get it to land on a good length. His best reward came with a LBW of the dangerous North Shore opener to set us on our way in the Grand Final. Returns of 2/4 and 2/5 in other games show his consistent bowling.

2020/21 NSW Youth Championships J.H. Creak Shield Semi Finalists

After winning the under 11 and under 12 Championships in the previous seasons, we were confident of claiming a hat-trick of wins, but it wasn't to be.



Team changes

This year we lost Harry McCracken and Keegan Webb to Division 1 but gained Zane Cassie, Gus Greenland and Luke Macfarlane. Last year's babies, Rohan Chang, Lachlan Coy and Will Toohey were too young to move up to u13, so Sam Roche and Harper Cole stepped up from the shadow squad.

Round 1 - The first hurdle

Our first game of the season was a grand final rematch against North Shore, and our first official game with COVID19 measures in play. It was also my first game as the new team coach, and this was likely to be a huge test for the boys.



After winning the toss and electing to bat, we finished the 40 overs on 6-229. Later I marveled at the quality of the worm we produced, which rose to the sky with every over of our innings. In the end North Shore finished on 6-129, a full 100 runs shy, and we'd secured our first win. While it was team effort, Robbie (72), Gus (58), were standout performances, as was Claude (2-15 off 8) and Harper (2-26 off 8).

Round 2 - The big wet

A cold windy Meadowbank welcomed us for our 2nd game of the season vs Northern Districts. The plan was to bowl first and end the match as quickly as possible, and before the rainy weather closed in. Alas we lost the toss, got sent in to bat and on 219 after 32 overs we attempted to declare but this was denied by the umpires. Forced to bat out the innings we put on 3-353 off 40. With spinners at both ends and rain falling, we raced through the overs and managed to dismiss Northern Districts for just 63 off



22 overs, to get the win. Gus (135no), Robbie (133no) & Vyv (39) were the stand-outs along with Harper (5-18 off 8), Tyrone (3-21 off 8) and Claude (2-17 off 3).

Round 3 was a washout for most, but not all teams, so we lost our position on top of the table.

Round 4 - Little run machines

In round 2 we had two centurions, in round 4 we had another 2. Hundreds are rare, but to have 4 in two consecutive games, that's a wow. Neo (106) and Gus (111no) piled on the runs before a final cameo from Robbie (34 off 13) saw us finish on 3-267. It was a fast ground, but Hornsby couldn't match us and finished 8-149.

Manly also enjoyed two 200+ run partnerships, which were the two highest in the comp - Gus & Robbie (206no) in round 2, and Gus and Neo (206) in round 4.

Round 5 - Barefoot

We welcomed St George to Lake Park and commemorated NAIDOC week with a barefoot ceremony, proud of the heritage within our group. The slow ground made for slow scoring, with our first four coming in the 23rd over. Neo (38) and Gus (38) combined for the biggest partnership of the game. Luke M (16) finally made his debut and kept the runs ticking over. Robbie (17) and Luke P (20) batted with maturity and power and we finished at 6-167 after 40. Sam (1-10 off 8, incl. 3 maidens) bowled brilliantly and was unlucky to trap the batsman LBW off his first ball, then have it reversed because there were 12 on the field. Harper (4-15/8) was unlucky not to snag 5 wickets. Some great catches supported the bowling and St George finished on 8-101 after 40. An exciting finish in the end as we just failed to get the bonus point on the 2nd last ball.

Rounds 6 and 7 - 20/20 double header

Highlights from our two 20/20 games where when chased a target in game 1 by opening with Luke K (39no) and Harper (29no), who never looked back, reaching the target without loss. Manly 0-73 off 13.2 overs against Canterbury. In game 2 we faced Penrith on a very slow ground, where once again Luke K (33no) finished unbeaten and scoring at a run a ball to set a target that Penrith couldn't reach.

Round 8 - A turning point

Manly welcomed Blacktown to a heat affected (reduced) 30 over game. Blacktown were just below us on the table and also undefeated so far. While we were a bit unlucky on the day, we didn't adjust to the 30 over format and finished a bit short at 6-132. Blacktown took their chances and reached the total with 2 overs to spare. This dropped us from 1st on the table and unfortunately, set us on target (after 1 more round game) to meet Parramatta in the Semi.



Round 9 - Final round

As expected, Manly breezed past Fairfield - Liverpool in the final round game after they set us 137 to win (6-136 off 40), with Neo's unbeaten 70 off 90 balls a highlight, Manly 2-139 in 30. This put us 2nd on the table, just ahead of Parramatta, which gave us a home final at Lake Park in Narrabeen.

Semi-final

The semi-final began with Tyrone winning yet another toss and electing to bat. Our openers Tyrone and Neo began solidly against some very accurate bowling, and we were 0-25 after 10, just shy of our 0-30 target. Tyrone (16) was caught at mid-wicket in the 11th over as he looked to lift the scoring rate, leading by example.



As the field hushed, Gus 'the Maestro' strode to the wicket, two hundreds under his belt this season, and looking for a third. Overs 11-20 is where Parramatta's tight bowling and fielding managed to hold us up, with the score at just 0-52, adding only 27. After drinks, and with plenty of bats in the shed we looked to kick on, with the 24th & 25th overs going for 8 runs each. When Gus (24) was caught, our score was 2-81, in the 25th.



With less than 15 overs left, and only 5 boundaries off the last 25 overs, we deployed Robbie aka 'the Weapon'. We've yet to see a team hold Robbie back when he makes a patient start, but the speed and quality of Parramatta's bowling kept him to just a single four and six, striking at a rate of only 100. Neo (36) fell soon after Robbie (25) arrived trying to hook a fast bouncer, that seemed to be well over his head, and with Luke K (7) and Robbie at the crease our total was still a competitive 3-102 after 30.

Sadly, as we tried to score quickly in the last 10 overs, it was one of Parramatta's giants P. Das (best average in the league at 3.77) who cut us down with his 4-6 off his 7 overs plus a run out. Losing 7-30 off the next 9 overs, Parramatta managed to bowl us out for 132. No other team had shut us down like this before. And while a score of 160 - 180 would have been ideal on this sort of ground, 132 was defendable in a final, for sure, as long as we took regular wickets.

Re-designing our bowling plan from the week before, we began with Robbie (0-27 off 8) and Tyrone (1-11 off 5) opening to precise fielding positions before Tyrone was rewarded with the first wicket coming in the 5th over - their opener caught at short cover (Neo).

At the 10 over mark Parramatta were just 1-18, and it looked like they were about to panic when their captain YA Singh was dismissed for just 10, caught Zane bowled Myles (1-11 off 3), with the score now 2-22 after 12 overs. Parra's two best batsmen were now at the crease, with AT Ranganath (3rd highest runs in the league) luckily surviving a very strong caught behind shout and then one for LBW. Both of which keeper Gussy said were out! How different the game might have been if one had been given. Sam (0-15 off 4) bowled accurately and with pace to keep them under control.

The biggest test of the day was Harper bowling to the other giant Dantu, who got the better of him this time, hitting him for 18 off the over, knocking him out of the attack. As Parra hit out and took risks, the Manly fielding were thrown into a spin, and our bowlers struggled to hold back these two very tall and strong batsmen, who seemed to find the boundary with ease. Manly still had opportunities when Dantu was caught by Luke M off bowling from Luke P (1-18 off 3), followed by Zane's direct hit run out, and Luke K (1-16 off 4) forcing a caught behind, taking the score to 5-94 in the 23rd.

In the end Parramatta were close enough and steadied to reach the target in the 31st over. Parramatta eventually went on to win the title by defeating Inner West.

Manly didn't do much wrong, and as Tyrone said 'we gave it our all'. I'm really proud of the boys, they are such a talented group who play their cricket with a lot of voice and usually find a way to win. To be fair to our boys, this is an age group where you can get big differences in size. I don't think that Parramatta are better cricketers than



us, but it was like 12 year olds taking on half grown men, and I don't remember there being such a difference in last year's Semi, when we beat them.

To the credit of everyone involved, the match was played hard, fair and with mutual respect. Well done to the boys for a season with many highlights and excellent performances. I really enjoyed my role as coach this season.

Took the new rock most weeks, in partnership with Claude or Sam. Bowled very tight and kept a good line all season and was unlucky not to bag more wickets. Didn't get a bat but always fields well, especially in the deep, taking 3 catches and effecting a good run out.

Harper Cole

Our tricky leg spinner and highest wicket taker (15) averaging just over 12. Bowled the most overs and produced the ball of the season by bowling a wrong-un that the batsman left and got bowled. Harper was also useful as an opening bat when you need someone more attacking. Always enthusiastic and surprisingly strong for his size, with some big hitting, including a big straight six. A great long throw in the field and took 3 catches and secured a couple of run outs.



Robbie Graham-McDowell

We nicknamed Robbie 'the weapon' and deployed him in the middle order where he earned a couple of outstanding batting performances, 133* and 72. An explosive batsman who can also terrorise with the ball with best bowling of 2-17. Game changing in the field, definitely our x-factor player.

Angus Greenland (Player of the Year)

Two hundreds and a fifty this season, and top run scorer in the whole division, nicknamed 'the maestro' for his lovely cover drives. Gus is the perfect number 3, as he's also an experienced opener who can help us reset if we lose an opener early, or





kick on and build partnerships in the middle overs. Gus is also a great keeper, taking 6 catches, 2 stumpings and a couple of run outs and an important leader in the team.

Tyrone Fender (Captain)

Tye opened the batting and had some solid starts and useful partnerships with Neo, which got us going. Tye also bowled very

useful off-spin and did well opening the bowling and keeping it tight in the semi-final. Tye is now an experienced captain and really brings a lot of energy and commitment to the role and deserves all the respect he gets from the lads. 3 catches and a stumping, always a solid fielder and occasional fill in keeper.

Luke Kennedy

Player of the T20 series (2 games) where he opened and carried his bat, and also came into the middle order in the second game and top scored. A good medium pace bowler which makes for a handy all-rounder, best bowling of 2/10. Thoughtful and focused on his game, and a great team player. These statistics are impressive; however, they do not include the wonderful bowling spells which went wicketless but provided the pressure for wickets to fall at the other end. Over the past few seasons Sth Eastern had managed to defeat us so often it would be fair to say they had become our bogey team. This was going to be a tough game and after losing the toss and sent into bat, we lost Preston early. Jack Donnan strode confidently to the crease to join Harry and they set about digging in & building a partnership. At 38, we lost Harry, then not long after, Ethan departed, leaving us a tad vulnerable at 3-59. SE were on a high. Luke joined Jack, who was hitting the ball confidently and looking set for a bit innings. The sun made an appearance after 2 weeks of cloud & rain, welcome back! The outfield appeared dry & the pitch was being rolled as we arrived at ESL. CW were on the back foot, stuck in a hole & struggling to get out at 2/16 after 7 overs. Then, they had to contend with the spinners Tom, Archie and Eshaan, who all continued the pain, bowling with consisted line & length, giving nothing away while at the same time building pressure & taking wickets. Preston, Eshaan and Will all chipped in with wickets as the large total was just too big to chase. CW bowled out in the 43rd over & Manly into the GF.

The rep season that kept on keeping on finally came to a conclusion. Due to COVID and various cluster bubbles, the grand final was repeatedly postponed... though never cancelled: all credit to the powers that be. The venue shifted too, starting in Auburn and ending at Manly Oval with a stop or two in between. Just as mercurial was the weather forecast which over the preceding week shifted from sunshine, to showers, then rain, then back again.

Early Sunday morning was grey, then rainy. But by the toss the sky was electric blue with fluffy white clouds riding a cooling sea breeze. With the forecast so hard to gauge and the possibility of a Duckworth-Lewis run chase, Ethan had pondered on the drive to the game whether to bat or bowl first. Luckily, he didn't have to choose as he lost the toss and let Sutherland throw the dice.

In the round game against them on November 29th, we'd won the toss and batted on the hottest day of the summer. After a poor start (4 for 27), Ethan had posted a big hundred with Luke's support and we'd won easily. But how would we go against Sutherland if they batted first, particularly after a two month break from competition?

As the Sutherland openers strolled out to make first use of a slightly green Manly Oval pitch, all those questions would be answered. Game on. This would be a true test of which was the better team.

The Sutherland openers made a few off the edge and a couple round the corner, but mostly they played and missed as Lewis swung the ball both ways at good pace. From the other end, Robbie bowled the spell of his life. He gave away a couple of twos as he warmed up in his first over, but that was all. The Sutherland lefthander looked in good touch — he'd made a hundred the day before - but a Tipton bullet pitched leg and smashed off stump to send him back to the pavilion for 7.

This brought their best batsman to the crease with nearly fifty overs to bat. Robbie and Lewis attacked him from the get-go, giving him nothing to get comfortable with. He took a couple of singles and kept the good balls out pretty easily. But, as we know, he loves to get his off-drive going. After fifteen balls for just two singles, Lewis had him driving at a ball that looked like the previous two inswingers but swung out late, just far enough to beat the edge. Next over he tried the same to Robbie and thickly snicked it, wide and low. It seemed it would beat both slip and keeper, but somehow Zach dived miles right to make one of the best catches and moments of the season. Zach's catch set the tone and made a statement that our fielding was going to be on today, and so it was.

By the time Lewis and Robbie had finished their spells, Sutherland were 2 for 15 off 10 and up against the ropes. But with 40 overs left to bowl, there was still plenty of time



for them to build a challenging total. Our first change bowlers had to keep the pressure on. Will rose to the challenge with his best spell of the season, barely conceding a run an over. At the other end, Tom did what Tom does, identifying and bowling straight at the batsmen's' weaknesses. Sutherland became ever more tentative as the pressure built. At last their opener, having managed just 2 from 27, edged a Tom slider past Zach where Ethan dived low and hard to his left, onto his injured chest, to take a superb catch. Sutherland 3 for 16 off about 20.

With Sutherland in deep doodoo, Ethan played the Archie-card, knowing his variations would throw the batsmen further off balance. A briefly steadying partnership of 20 was broken when one of their other top batsmen, under severe run-rate pressure, skied an Archie fully high to mid-on where Lewis took the catch. Similarly, Sutherland's captain took Archie on, missed a beautiful leg break and was skilfully stumped by Zach. Soon after, Archie bowled Sutherland's stubborn number 5 (16 off 47), to finish with 3 for 11 off 6 overs. By this time, Eshaan had joined the attack from the north and removed two more batsmen in a fine spell of controlled leg spin. Between them our leggies took 5 for 25 off 11 overs.

The Sutherland tail was stubborn but could only add another 15 or so runs. Will returned for another excellent spell to finish with 1 for 12 off 8. Tom completed his ten overs to finish with a miserly 1 for 10. Robbie needed just 3 balls of his second spell to take the tenth wicket and top the bowling honours with a brilliant 3 for 9. Lewis was unlucky to go wicketless, his 7 overs costing just 11; and Preston's 4 overs cost just 9.

So, Sutherland all out for 81, five overs short of their 50. That answered the question of how would they go if they batted first. Now... how would we chase on a slow and turning wicket?

Harry and Jack batted with terrific intent from the outset, putting bat to ball hard and taking every run on offer. 7 came off the first over; 5 from the second. The Sutherland bowlers couldn't find the pressure line-and-length and our openers made them pay. In keeping with the mood, the Sutherland fielders missed some sharp chances and the openers cashed in.

Wisely, Sutherland cast around for a bowler who could make a difference and eventually they found him. At 0 for 48 Jack clocked a full toss from their second leggy square but in the air where the deep fielder made a good catch. Was this the break Sutherland needed? With only 33 needed, this was their chance. One or two balls later, I can't remember which due to the associated trauma, Harry was drawn down the pitch by a floater that dipped, drifted and spun, and was stumped. You could have heard a pine needle drop as Preston walked out to bat. Game on.



Ethan had owned the Sutherland bowlers in Round 9, but today even from the stands you could see his chest injury was hurting and impeding him at nearly every shot, amplifying the pressure of the battle. Preston was under the pump too as the Sutho leggie had the ball on a string. After facing seven balls on nought, Preston half-played-half-left a ball that trickled off the under edge of his bat and bowled him. Three Manly wickets gone on 48. Sutherland cock-a-hoop. Out came Luke Watts.

Next over, Ethan clipped a loose legside half-tracker to the boundary and the Manly community took its first breath for twenty minutes. But when he tried to guide a short, wide one to third man a few balls later, he feathered an edge. Manly 4 for 54. Sutherland had been 5 for 51. We were barely ahead. Out came Will Brewster.

Wattsy saw off another dangerous over from their leggie, then Will clipped a legside half volley from their medium pacer for four. The Sutherland bowlers were struggling to get their line right to our first left-right batting combination. Wattsy was surviving the bombshells and waiting, waiting, waiting for a loose ball. When he finally received a fully, he hit it straight, only just far enough to clear the deep mid-on and deep mid-off.

The leggie, perhaps starting to tire after a magnificent spell, gave Will another rank half-tracker that on any other occasion would have ended up on the tennis courts. But manfully resisting his natural urge to give it what it deserved, Will tried to nurse it to leg for a risk-free one or two. Instead, he got a leading edge and was caught at square leg.

With 12 still to get, I anxiously looked down the list to see who was left to bat: Tom Molloy, Robbie Tipton, Zach O'Sullivan... and decided everything would be okay. There's so much depth in this team. Tom, Robbie and Zach would bat top five in some of the teams we play against. Zach alone has played at least two heroic innings batting at number ten or eleven. These blokes are competitors. They weren't going to let us lose. This is how this Manly team has made the Grand Final; this is why we're here.

By contrast, Sutherland continued to go off the boil. Their last change bowler bowled three front-foot no-balls, allowing us to inch closer towards the total, and enough loose short, ones for Tom to cash in to third man. Suddenly we needed 4 to win and Tom sent a leg-side fully to the boundary. Relief! It was fitting that Tom hit the winning runs — he's contributed so much to this team over the years. And Wattsy had played one of the most important 4 not outs (off 33) in cricket history!

It wasn't the most emphatic, stylish win, but the mid-innings collapse gave us a chance to show our depth. It also showed how important it had been to finish the Sutherland innings off the way we did, and how significant our great catches had been. When



things had got tight, as they had earlier in the season against other sides, we'd once again proved to be the better side. Sutherland's leggie (4 for 14 off 7) was awarded the player of the final, but I thought Zach could have won it for his superb keeping and / or Robbie for his brilliant bowling.

So, two premierships in four seasons and a country carnival win? Hard work and solid planning resulting in great team performances. We had a bit of luck with the way the weather went in a couple of the Round games (Hornsby and St George), but beyond that, the team made it happen. And it was the team; everyone contributed. A few of the boys were right up there in the comp batting and bowling averages, but no-one could argue they did it by themselves. And every player improved throughout the season.

Thank you again to the coaching staff - Paul, Scott & Luke - Manager Emma, Fi and Maggie for scoring and to all the parents for another rewarding, unforgettable season of cricket.

And to the boys: we are so proud of how you play the game.

Round 4 we travelled to beautiful Balmoral to play North Shore on turf. I have to say there wasn't to many highlights in this game! Apart from the swim at the beach at lunch and after the game.

The 2 highlights came from Ben Leman who took 5 for 21 from 10 overs with two great spells of fast bowling and our Captain Ollie Goldsworthy who played his best innings of the Season on a pitch that was breaking up by the minute. A masterful display of patience and positive batting saw him bat around two and half hours and bring up the winning runs. Well done boys!

Round 5 we travelled to Hornsby and played on Berowra Oval which hadn't been played on the previous day so it was in amazing condition for the game. We were asked to bat first, and the boys were very cautious with 1-18 of 15 overs. The Hornsby boys came with great intent in the field and were the best fielding team we had played against. We needed to accelerate, and we did, Ollie Goldsworthy backed up his last Round innings with a superb 56, he did all the hard work and actually deserved more runs but he was backed up by Tom Cole who scored a destructive 40 runs and took us to a respectable 130.

We were confident going into the bowling innings and the bowlers were very good keeping the Hornsby boys to 3-42 of 25 overs at the half-way mark. Hornsby then put 2 good partnerships together and edged closer to our total. The Manly boys continued taking wickets buts runs still flowed and the pressure was building. In the end we bowled Hornsby all out for 122 in the 48th over, it was a close game but a hard fought win and put the boys in good stead for the remaining games.

Round 6 and the Mathematicians of the Team were called upon to work out the run rate needed to get the boys into 2nd place with us being level with Hornsby in 2nd place

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on the Ladder. Team Manager Paul Goldsworthy came through with the goods! After hours of cross-checking numbers and formulas and re-reading of the IDCA Rule Book, Paul sent through his spreadsheet and with help from Warren Evans we worked out a plan to get these boys into the GF. The only problem with the Maths was it came down to a coin toss! We had to bat first, score a 'motsa' then bowl Canterbury Wests out for not much... Easy!

We succeeded with the first part of the equation with batting first and scoring a 'motsa'. Our best batting performance of the year saw the boys put on 256 with Alfie Gatehouse the star. Alfie scored 72 from 92 balls, he showed all his skills and was supported by the Captain Ollie Goldsworthy with 24, Matt Evans with 41, Dustin Labador 35 from 36 balls and Tom Cole 35 from 29 balls! Great intent and a great confidence boost for our batsmen.

What we could not control was the weather. The rain came in at the lunch break and we didn't get back on to bowl for over 2 hours. The total was revised for Canterbury and the pressure was on for us to take 10 wickets. Our first task was to bowl 25 overs, so we officially had a game and therefore a result.

The Manly boys were ruthless, Tom Cole stood out with some crucial wickets and Matt Evans cleaned up the tail with honestly 10 minutes of light remaining. The game finishing just after 7pm, it was a huge day!

The boys had done everything they were asked of in regards to results to make the Grand Final but we had to wait till Monday morning to confirm the IDCA had the same formulas as us to confirm we had a better run-rate than Hornsby. With great relief we were confirmed as playing in the Grand Final and the boys were bursting with excitement and we had a great week of training. We were thrown a few curve balls during the week but thanks to Manly's President, Scott Brewster, all issues were resolved, and we finally worked out where we were playing.

We arrived at Monty Bennett Oval to play Parramatta who were undefeated for the Season and who we beat in a thriller in last year's Grand Final. To say Parramatta were fired up was an understatement, they wanted to win, and it showed. After a late start due to the pitch not having covers put on the previous day and still being wet in spots, Parramatta won the toss and to our amazement wanted to bat first.

The Manly opening bowlers Ben Leman and Tom Cole gave the Coach an early Xmas present, they had Parramatta 2 for 1 of 10 overs! Yes, that's right 10 overs. The joy continued with Will Read, Matt Evans, Zac Buchanan and Josh Pearson sharing the rest of the wickets. The fielding backed up the bowling. Cooper Swinney took the catch of the Season, a lofted shot that went over his head, he twisted and turned running backwards then dived full length taking a ridiculous catch right in front of the

Team that had fun along the way. After Coaching this team for four years now this was by far the most enjoyable year, the reason for this was not the results but the calibre of boys and parents. The Parents should be enormously proud of their boys in this group, they are respectful, determined, funny and love playing with each other for Manly. A big thank you to the Shadow Squad boys who trained with us all Season, your time will come, stay patient, and keep enjoying your cricket. Special mention to James Olde who turned up and supported the Team at every game.

Our Leading Run Scorer was our Captain Ollie Goldsworthy, our leading Wicket Taker was Tom Cole and our top Fielder was Angus Williams.

Can I thank Warren Evans for his constant reassurance and insight into the game, you really passed on some fantastic knowledge to the boys, especially our bowlers. I would like to also thank Paul Goldsworthy and his Family. You gave so much time to this Team, behind the scenes and on match day, you were 1st to arrive at the games and last to leave, thanks again. To the Parents, thank you for getting your boys to every training and organised for game days and thank you for your support, it was a such a nice group to be involved with and I hope you enjoyed it too.

Well after three years we have three Championship Trophies, the boys have worked so hard and it is a great reward for them. I hope they enjoyed the Year and are looking forward to next Year which will be even tougher with all the teams wanting to take down the Champs!

With injuries came opportunities, all the boys that came into the team not only held their own but brought great energy, enthusiasm, and a willingness to learn.

With COVID-19 the pre-season trial games were restricted to local teams only. A huge thank you goes out to Jordan Daily (Coach) and the U16/17 DCA side for their assistance.

Round 1 vs SEJCA:

This match featured an impressive batting and bowling display against one of the premier sides. The loss from the previous year was very much fresh and the boys were determined to turn the tables this time.

Batting first the boys showed a maturity in batting seldom seen in young players. Losing on only 4 wickets, they set a total of 251 with Bailey Foster (60), Roop Dhillon (58) and Andrew Boulton (96).





SEJCA came out playing some positive cricket and looked in control at 0/45. A bowling change by captain AB to bring on Will Matheson (8 overs 0-12) and Ryan McPhee frustrated the opposition into a wicket in Ryan's third over. With fresh batsmen at crease, Andrew Boulton (5 over 0-5) took control. Into the attack came his Leg Spinner (Roop Dhillon 10 overs 3-29) with himself from the other. They ripped through the top and middle order, leaving Seth Thompson (5 over 1-16) and Josh Lawson (8.2 over 4-13) to clean up the remaining wickets through some great stump to stump bowling. SEJCA all out 10/126. A great start.

Round 2 vs Hornsby was set to be our tester. High from the SEJCA win the boys were desperate to get on the field put the cleaners through last year's premiers. Not to be with the weather winning out.

Round 3 versus St George was a game that we needed to play and get a strong win but unfortunately the rain once again spoiled the plans.

Round 4 vs North Shore:

With some teams in our pool getting on the previous week, we needed to get back to playing cricket and winning. Unfortunately, it was not to be. Losing the toss and being asked to bowl, the Manly boys bowled without luck but kept the runs under control through some great fielding in the inner circle by Hayden MacFarlane and Jack Slater.

The opening pair of Josh Lawson (10 overs 1-35) and Angus McConnell (7 overs 2/21) got us off to a great start, Gus sending the middle stump of the North Shore opener somersaulting toward our keeper Billy Kwan. The highlight of the game was Patrick Day (8 overs 1/19) taking his first wicket with his first ball in Div 1 to remove the other opening batsman.

But the excitement was to be short lived as we learned of the news of another injury – only after bowling 3 overs, Jake Hutchings left the ground not to bowl for the rest of the game. North Shore took advantage of this and with luck going their way, catches finding grass, and our bowlers starting to get frustrated, they continued towards a good total. Andrew Boulton (10 overs 3/49) Seth Thompson (2 overs 0/8) and Roop Dhillon (10 overs 1/54) tried hard to drag back the momentum but when it is not your day, it's not your day.

Chasing 198 on a two-paced wicket was always going to be tough. Openers Jack Slater and Bailey Foster made a conservative start. Manly fell short despite a resilient innings by Jack Slater (12) and some hard hitting towards the end by Josh Lawson (18 no). Our first Loss.



In the week leading into the next game, it was decided to gamble on a team bonding session at the expense of one training session. The night included Trivia, Prizes (including boxes of Chocolate – very popular) and Pizza, and then to top it all off the MC of the event being none other than Michael Slater, a night the 12 boys would become a team. The Trivia winners (Team JR - Josh and Roop) were more interested in the second prize, box of chocolates. Not going to happen, as delighted captain AB closing out the box on his well-earned prize.

Round 5 vs Northern District:

A game that we desperately needed to win but also secure a bonus to get back in contention for the semi-finals. A loss would mean the end of our finals hopes.

Manly won the toss and chose to bat. Needing a big total, the opening pair of Bailey Foster and Roop Dhillon, played some aggressive and positive cricket, chancing their hands on a number of occasions and taking the attack to the opposition. The opening stand was 137 after 24 overs before the fall of Bailey Foster's wicket on a well-made 50. Andrew Boulton and Roop Dhillon continued the momentum, going at a great rate and playing some selfless cricket to take the total to 190 after 32 overs. Roop Dhillon getting out just before drinks on a well-made 85 off 96 balls.

It seemed like the boys were now starting to trust each other and play positive cricket. Jack Slater played the anchor role, continuously rotating the strike for the in-form Andrew to hit boundaries at will. Jack was soon out but after a great 18 off 26. Andrew Boulton continued to finish the innings off and making the tired bowlers pay for every loose ball. Well supported by Jake Hutchings Andrew brought up 100 off 81 balls to close the Manly innings on a mammoth total of 5 for 307.

Michael Kwan quickly calculated the Bonus point target and provided it to the coach. The team was given a challenge to keep the opposition below 160, allowing 10 runs for safe keeping. Our Opening bowlers, Josh Lawson (8 overs 1/19) and Angus McConnell (8 overs 2/27) inspired the team's bowling display by ripping into the opposition taking two early wickets to have the ND struggling at 2 for 21 after 7 overs. Patrick Day (3 overs 0/15) and Miles O-Grady (3 overs 0/4) came into the attack and bowled with great control and discipline to keep the runs down. With the pressure on the opposition to score runs, the captain introduced spin from one end (Roop Dhillon 10 over 2/26 and Seth Thompson 7 overs 1/19) with himself at the other (Andrew Boulton 8 over 2/26) taking away any hopes of a victory from ND. Manly victory with a Bonus point.

Round 6 T20 vs Blacktown:

In the past few seasons, the T20s were nervous times for Manly and the tension was there again this year. A simple plan, a bunch of determined boys, add some words of



inspiration from Michael Slater at training, and finally a supporting video made specifically for the team by the master of T20 himself, Ollie Davies, were surely the ingredients to bring some great results. Thanks boys.

The first game was moved to a backup ground and shortened to 18 overs due to the wicket being left uncovered overnight. Blacktown won the toss and quickly called to bat first. There was some disciplined bowling and STAR wicket keeping by Billy Kwan, taking 5 catches and 1 stumping for the game (equivalent of a 5f or 100 for a batsmen). Well Done Billy. This was backed up by great fielding by Manly restricting the opposition to 6/120 after 18 overs. The pick of the bowlers being Seth Thompson (3 overs 2/19), Josh Lawson (4 over 2/19), Andrew Boulton (4 overs 1/22), and Jake Hutchings (3 overs 1/18). They were well supported by Gus McConnell (1 over 0/4) and Patrick Day (1 over 0/5).

Needing 6.7 runs per over and with 12 nervous boys, a discussion took place between the two senior players Andrew and Roop. A call was made to take matters into their own hands and open the batting. It took a couple of seconds to sink in with the coach and parents, but when we all looked at the determination that was in their eyes, it was a no-brainer.

One final question from the boys before going out – how do we want to approach this? Answer: We limit the Dot Balls and play proper cricket shots and we win the game.

A cautious but steady start, rotating the strike, and putting the bad balls away was just what was needed. The boys batted brilliantly, accelerating when needed to take the score to 0/104. With 17 to go, Roop lost his wicket making a great 39 and setting the platform for a great chase. With Andrew still in the centre, Bailey Foster coming in needing 17 off 24 balls, it was looking like a training drill -- the opposition not knowing whether to protect the boundary or a single. Andrew punished them with some brilliant innovative shots, moving to offside and scooping to fine leg for four. Andrew (70no off 49) finished the game off in great style hitting two consecutive boundaries; well support by Bailey who finished with 4 no. Great Win.

Round 7 T20 vs Hawkesbury:

The heat had already hit the high 30's during the first game and had taken its toll -- both Andrew and Roop needed hydration and a rest before taking to the field.

The boys had just witnessed a great victory and experienced firsthand how to approach a T20 innings. With this wisdom in our pockets, it was time for Bailey and Jake to play their part. Manly won the toss and chose to bat first. The openers picked up where the other two had left off and scored freely taking the score to 79 before losing our first wicket of Jake for a great 38 runs. Needing to close out a great start,

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Andrew Boulton and Bailey showed great acceleration to take the score to a solid 128. A score that seemed below par to an outsider, but we knew it was going to be hard with the wicket providing plenty of support for the seamers.

Some great bowling by Andrew Boulton (3.3 over 2/18) and Jake Hitchings (2 overs 2/10) set the Hawkesbury team on the back foot. Manly showed great commitment in field with Ryan McPhee, the boundary rider, regularly diving to save boundaries. Jack Slater, Seth Thompson, Bailey Foster and Vehaan Akbarally's brilliant anticipation within the circle set the standard.

With one of their star batsmen still in, scoring quickly taking the score from 3/47 to 3/86, we needed a breakthrough. Into the attack came Roop Dhillon (4 overs 2/19) beating the batsmen and presented two stumping chances for Billy Kwan who executed them with lightning-fast hands both times — the batsmen not having any chance of recovery after advancing to the spinner. The wicket celebrations showed how much it meant to the boys.

With scoreboard pressure increasing and big hitters in the dressing room, Andrew went in for the final blow, bringing the field up into the circle, challenging the batsmen to hit over the top. The highlight of the game was the over by our Mr. Consistent (Patrick Day), 1 over 2 wickets for 2 runs closing out the Hawkesbury innings – all out 116. A great win to finish the day: 2 from 2, first time in three years. Well Done Boys.

Round 8 vs Sutherland Shire:

Confident from the two T20 wins, Manly went into this game with the season on the line, this being a must win game. The heat played a part in the start time and format, shortening the game to 30 overs.

Manly won the toss and decided to bat first, we lost two early wickets (Jake Hutchings [12] and Bailey Foster [2]) to be 2/24 after 7 overs. Two fresh batsmen in the middle, Andrew and Roop once again batted with authority taking minimum risks to take the score to 100 after 26 overs before Roop (26) lost his wicket as we looked to accelerate. Now with a good platform, with wickets and overs remaining, big hitters were sent in to crank the run rate. Unfortunately, this did not come off on this occasion, but some brilliant acceleration from Andrew Boulton (78no) got the total to 131.

With the heat now hitting the high thirties and the umpires keeping one eye on this number, the opening bowlers ran in hard and bowled good tight lines with edges consistently going between fielders or short of catchers. The boys continued to build pressure with short spells: Andrew Boulton (6 overs 0/32), Jake Hutchings (4 overs 0/24), Josh Lawson (4 overs 0/15), and Patrick Day (3 over 0/11). It was not until the 15th over before Gus McConnell (3 over 1/10) was rewarded with the first wicket.

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The heat was starting to take its toll. Several close chances and some lapses in the field allowed the opposition take sharp singles and rebuild. With the game starting to get away from Manly, the captain once again called on his spinners Seth Thompson and Roop Dhillon to provide some impact. With some good support from the boundary rider, Ryan McPhee, Vehaan Akbarally, Jack Slater and Jake Hutchings Manly looked to change the game in our favour with two quick wickets from Roop Dhillon (4 over 2/17) and another one from Seth Thompson after some sharp work from the keeper Billy Kwan (3 overs 1/15).

Now the scene was set for a close finish, Sutherland needing 35 runs off 30 balls and Andrew and Jake to finish the overs off. You would put your money on Manly 10 times out of 10, but full credit must go to the Sutherland batsmen, who put our tired fielders under pressure and continually turned the strike to win in the last over. Disappointing result but proud of how they handled it.

Round 9 vs Inner West Harbour:

With Manly out of contention for the finals and one further injury to fast bowler Josh Lawson the boys were determined to finish on a high.

IWH won the toss and chose to bat first. Opening bowlers Angus McConnell (8.2 over 0/18) and Ryan McPhee (5 over 1/08) were relentless in their opening spells, giving no width and asking the batsmen plenty of questions. Ryan McPhee struck in his second over, going straight through the defences of the opener and knocking over his castle. As the pressure continue to mount on the batting side, IWH took on the wrong fielder for a quick single in Jake Hutchings and the result was a brilliant run out.

IWH now 2/11 after 6 and struggling to get the scoreboard moving, a bowling change from Manly. Seth Thompson (5 over 0/16) and Patrick Day (5 over 5/4) bowled brilliantly as a pair, Seth keeping it tight at one end with Patrick bowling stump to stump. It was not long before Patrick Day picked up two quick wickets to have IWH struggling at 4/29 after 16 overs.

Captain Andrew Boulton brought himself and his leg spinner into contention to rip through the remaining batsmen and head into the shade for an early afternoon. Jack Slater and Seth Thompson started the rebuilding journey taking the score to 30 before Jack was trapped LBW for a well-made 5. Manly now 2/30 and the bowlers with their tails up, Seth was joined by keeper-batsman Bill Kwan. They scored freely, rotating the strike regularly and Seth playing some glorious shots all around the park. Billy Kwan was trapped LBW as he tried to finish the game quickly and was soon joined in the sheds by Seth Thompson, runout for a well-constructed and positive 32 runs. With only 15 runs to get both Andrew Boulton (9 no) and Roop Dhillon (4 no) came together to finish off the game and sing the team song for the final time in the season. A brilliant finish to the season.

All-in-all, a good season where the boys showed plenty of resilience and fighting qualities during tough times. This team is full of immensely talented boys that I am sure you will hear a lot more of in the cricketing world. I was extremely fortunate to have a tremendous group of parents who supported me throughout the year, so thank you. Finally, I like to extend my thanks to the best manager in the world Michael Kwan who was awesome as ever in organising and communicating throughout the year.

Before getting into the full report - because I know the boys probably won't make it all the way through (teenage attention spans) - I just want to address the boys.

Boys, I again want to formally congratulate you on a season to be proud of. Every single one of you improved your game throughout the season, with some working very hard and making remarkable progress. In addition to that, each every one of you are respectful young men who clearly continue to benefit from the many (admittedly sometimes harsh) lessons that cricket can teach us. Of course, the elephant in the room is the way our season ended. I just want to congratulate every single one of you



on how you overcame and moved past the injustice of this. It would be all too easy for us to carry this chip on our shoulder for the coming seasons and wallow in the pettiness and negativity that the grown adults who created this situation sadly seem to be driven by, but it is a reflection of the maturity of you all that you have managed overcome your no doubt intense disappointment and unfairness of the process to still come together at the end of the season to celebrate what we had achieved. To go from 3 wins and 6 losses last year to only the one loss, with a team made up with a near-even split of previous Rep and Preso's Cup players is an achievement you should be very proud of. In addition to this, the progression of numerous players through the Manly Grade setup continued to show the learning and development gained from the season. Keep working hard, be open to feedback (although limit technical feedback to a few trusted people) and being a team player and I see some of you in Manly 1st Grade within 5-7 seasons. If you want it.

The 2020-21 Watson Shield season was a particularly strange season of cricket, but not in one of the myriad usual ways that seasons of cricket are usually strange. Coming into the season there was doubt about whether the competition would go ahead at all. These doubts were only cleared up very late in the piece, at which point we became aware that the Watson Shield (previously an u/16 comp) would now be an u/17 competition, effectively open to all Watson Shield players of the year previous, and would be a 7-team competition requiring a bye for each team. With minimal guidance from the governing cricket body on player numbers from previous age groups it was decided - in order to preserve the development role that Watson Shield had always provided to the Green Shield - to select a maximum of three u/17 boys in our squad of thirteen.

With a few withdrawals from the squad during the trials and selection process it was great to see a large number of boys from last years' Presidents' Cup team get the opportunity to step up to the Rep level, where many continued to learn and gain confidence in their game. Indeed, our Player of the Year, Keelan Mendel, was one such player.

The season got off to a slow start with our bye coming in the first round, only to be followed by a washout the next week against St George. A very close and undoubtedly character-building win over Inner West Harbour away was followed by a more clinical performance against Sutherland at home. It was great to see the boys not just enjoying their cricket but also understanding what was needed both in order to build pressure with the ball and withstand pressure with the bat.

A couple of injuries contributed to our disappointing loss to Blacktown the following week, which brought us back down to earth, however it also showed that the areas of our game we had discussed after previous weeks' victories were clearly still areas we



need to improve on if we were to win this competition - a goal stated at the outset of our campaign. Off the back of this loss we rebounded with an impressive win over Canterbury & Western Suburbs and felt confident going into what we knew would be an important game against a strong Parramatta side who needed to win to get through to the finals.



The Parramatta game at the postage stamp that is Monty Bennett Oval will undoubtedly go down in the memory of all who watched it as an incredible game of cricket. Batting first on a quality batting deck with some of the smallest boundaries I have ever seen (and further taken in from the concrete guttering for safety reasons we put together 5/356 thanks to 116 (123) to Billy O'Brien, 82 (99) for captain Josh Cooper, 24 (13) to Ky Broome and an insane 92 (27 incl 14 sixes) to Joel Davies who played to ensure his eligibility to play for us in finals if required. In response, Parramatta reached 331 all out on the penultimate ball of their innings. That's only 13 shy of 700 runs in a junior cricket 50-over match. In addition to being an incredible spectacle once the adrenalin subsided this game also provided many of the boys with valuable lessons, with both bat and ball in hand. The catch that Darcy Fleming took to remove their talented grade player who made 143 and could have taken the game away from us will be something that he - and all of us - will remember for a long time.



Unfortunately this would be the last game that this side would play together, with the learned administrators responsible for the administration of Watson Shield deliberately misappropriating a particular qualification rule to initially dock 6 points from us for using an ineligible player, and then later to fully remove us from the competition, despite us finishing comfortably in the top 4. This rule requires that all players play junior cricket for the area they are picked to represent at the rep level. This is to prevent out of area poaching - an understandable and appropriate rule. At most clubs the junior and senior cricket clubs are counted as one organisation, allowing all boys who play grade to be automatically eligible for Rep cricket for that club. However, due to the separate incorporation of MWJCA as a separate entity to the grade club (MWDCC) this rule had the effect that our boys who were exclusively playing men's Grade cricket (as many boys from all clubs do at this age) were effectively rendered ineligible - despite playing all their junior cricket for Manly. As a relatively objective party (albeit with a Manly connection) with no relative of mine (that I know of) playing in this competition it continues to be unclear to me how or why this rule was invoked in this way except in this instance to allow Parramatta - who initially complained about this - to get into the finals.

There is no doubt that this was an extremely disappointing outcome for the boys, who had played some gutsy, skilful cricket and had earned their position in the finals. They deserved an opportunity to play finals. Unfortunately, they were denied this. There is no point dwelling further on this, however before moving on I wish to make it clear to the administrators that it is now incumbent on us to rectify this situation so that it cannot happen again. I understand that this is not the first or even second time that this has happened to us. Given this, and despite that fact that this rule is clearly being used to our exclusive detriment it is now our responsibility to the boys to ensure that this cannot happen again. If it does, we have failed the boys as much as those who instigated the process against us.

Now to the essential thanking of key people - The season would simply not have been possible without the outstanding logistical and organisational support of Manager Mark Cooper and the incredible, versatile support of Assistant Coach Craig Mendel. Craig and Mark, you were both invaluable in discussing the many cricket and not-so-cricket-related issues we encountered this season. Also, a big thank you to Josh Cooper, who balanced his own performance with captaining the boys throughout what was a tough season. Josh (I know you'll be able to get through this report), I really appreciated your open-mindedness to some of the more Mike Pawley-esque of my suggestions this year and admire the way you led the boys. Thank you also to Scott Brewster for his assistance and support as Junior Chairman and Kel Morrison for your assistance, banter and especially coming on as coach of the Watson Preso's - you were perfect for the job.





Finally, I want to thank the parents - particularly those who chauffeured not just their own children, but occasionally me, to games across this vast, sometimes gridlocked city of ours. Without you, the boys would not have the support they need to pursue this passion of theirs. Thank you also for your support of, and trust in me as a new, largely unknown coach coming in. As only having coached this year I can't speak too much to this, however I feel it's appropriate to reflect on the journey that both you and your sons have come on, over the however many years your family has had the experience (it's the only appropriate word!) of playing representative cricket for Manly. I hope you gained some of the same lifelong friends that I know that both I and my parents did when I had the privilege of playing reps. I hope you felt, and will always feel, part of the Manly family and know that those countless hours together on the field/by the sideline/in the car have created another support network that you could call on - myself included - should the need ever arise.

I look forward to seeing you and the excellent young men you have produced at a Manly Grade training/match in the near future.
